**PERTINENT REASONS.**

Those who believe that the principles and policies of the republican party are the best for the country have as many and as good reasons as heretofore for desiring the continuation of that party in power. Indeed, since the democratic party has done nothing, and evidently is unable to do anything to remove the just and deep distrust with which the people regard it, and since, on the other hand, the republican party has shown and is daily demonstrating that it is vigorous, healthful, alert, earnest and progressive as ever heretofore, the same cogent reasons exist which for many years have existed why it should be continued in power.

But in addition to all this republicans in Oregon have yet other reasons why they should labor for the success of the party at the approaching June election.

For long, and with some show of reason, many republicans complained that the rank and file of the party had little or no voice in selecting the party's candidates. The primary law was devised to enable every member of the party to participate in the nomination of candidates. For the first time in the history of the party in the state it had candidates chosen directly by the party. For this reason the entire ticket now presented is clearly entitled to, and should receive the earnest support of every republican. This is true of the whole ticket, and it should be, and we firmly believe it will be triumphantly elected. The hottest contest will doubtless be over the election of governor.

Governor Chamberlain is a smooth, astute politician. Bound by the laws, he nor any other man could avoid making a fairly creditable record as executive. Within his own discretion he has shown himself to be an intense partisan—a democrat in full harmony with his party—a party distrusted by the people. Geo. E. Chamberlain represents nothing the people want that is not as fully, intelligently and courageously and far more safely represented by Dr. James Withycombe, the republican nominee. He is not a politician. So much the better; he will devote no time to practicing the wily arts of the politician. He is a republican from earnest conviction that republican principles are good and wholesome, and freighted with the greatest good for the greatest number. His honesty, his fearlessness and his rugged good sense are marked characteristics

in his make-up and are freely admitted by all who know him. Added to these is his ample and correct knowledge of what the people need for their prosperity and happiness and what the state requires for its yet more rapid progress and development.

He is in every way entitled to the earnest support of all republicans, and deserves that of all good citizens. We predict his election by a vote many hundred in excess of the usual republican vote.

**HIS APPOINTMENTS.**

A plutocratic publication issued at Portland instances Governor Chamberlain's appointments as strong reasons why he finds staunch support outside of the party. He appointed Judge Harris to the additional judgeship in this district because Judge Hamilton is a democrat. He filled a vacancy on the supreme bench by appointing a democrat because the two other judges are republicans.

It is probable he appointed a democrat to the U. S. senate because the other senator is a republican.

The Governor knows that one of the most senseless and groundless "scares" is the fear that our Judiciary is in any danger whatever of becoming partisan. He knows, too, that in this district are eminently well qualified democratic lawyers, who, because of their long party service, supplemented by their fitness, should have received the compliment of appointment.

If he does not know, he is likely to learn, ere long, that he would assuredly have gained more friends and also more certainly retained those he had by appointing a democrat to the judgeship and a republican to the senatorship. The governor is not the first actor who has made the mistake of playing to the galleries when he would better have kept in his lines.

We rejoice in the appointment of Judge Harris and merely mention the matter to show the Governor's politics.

**REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.**

Issues of the Campaign are now Sent Forth.

The Republican State central committee at its session last week appointed a sub-committee to draw up a platform of issues and principles endorsed. W. W. Banks, W. W. Steiwer, W. J. Church, John Cox and W. S. Duniway composed the committee and the following is the result of their deliberations:

Resolved, That the Republicans in Oregon, proud of the party's achievements and confident of its continued usefulness in the future, renew their enthusiasm in the faith and pledge each other to work together in harmony and good fellowship with the single purpose of securing to the state and to the Nation the perpetuation of the principles of Republicanism; and we congratulate our people on the happy cessation of the factional differences that have militated against Republican success in the past.

Resolved, That we reaffirm the principles of the National Republican platform adopted at Chicago, June 22, 1904, and congratulate the country upon the continuation of the era of prosperity that began under the wise and beneficent administration of public affairs by a Republican President and a Republican congress. It is a source of gratification to our people that our great growth and the unexampled development of the resources of mine, farm and workshop since 1897 is due to the fact that the Republican party, with its policy of protection and its stand for a safe and honest monetary system, has exercised the functions of government. With its bright records of achievement, the Republican party expects a continuance of the confidence heretofore manifested in its policies and administrations. We therefore call upon the people of Oregon to give their support in the June election to the party of protection, progress and prosperity.

Resolved, That President Roosevelt's administration of the affairs of the Nation, at home and abroad, justifies the faith of the people in him as a wise and patriotic executive. We especially commend the steps taken by him to promote internal peace and contentment in the Philippines and to encourage the trade relations of our people with the several nations of the Orient. In his battle for civil righteousness he is entitled to the co-operation of all good citizens.

Resolved, That we heartily commend the principle embodied in the initiative

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and republican endorsement to the constitution. We urge the Republicans of Oregon to do it by the ballot and measure proposed hereunder. This has been approved by two successive Republican Legislatures and adopted by the electors of the strongly Republican state, eliminates individual dictatorship and brings back to the people the control of their political affairs.

Resolved, That the first trial in Oregon of the direct primary law and Statute No. 1, thereof proves it to have been the means of re-ordering the people's will in the choice of candidates for public office, and the Republican party claims the credit thereof. The nominees so chosen are men of integrity, courage and ability who deserve and are entitled to receive the loyal, cordial and enthusiastic support of every Republican elector in the state.

Resolved, That the Republican party favors the investment of capital in improvements and enterprises in the state of Oregon with such regulation and control of corporations as will protect the rights and interests of the people.

Resolved, That the Republicans of Oregon favor just and equitable taxation of both tangible and intangible property, and are unalterably opposed to granting personal franchises.

Resolved, That we favor legislation that will require private bank trust companies and saving banks to make true and accurate semi-annual reports of their financial condition similar to those required of National banks by the banking laws of United States, to the end that the rights of the depositors and the people of the state with whom they do business shall be fully protected.

Resolved, That we favor the loaning of idle funds of the state on call, with ample securities, at highest rates of interest possible to obtain consistent with absolute safety of the funds so loaned; the interest arising therefrom to be paid into the treasury of the state.

Resolved, That the interest of the people of the state of Oregon demands government ownership of the locks at Oregon City.

Resolved, That the government of the state should be invested with the power to veto individual items in appropriation bills.

Resolved, That we strongly commend the efforts of our representatives in congress in securing appropriations for the rivers and harbors of our state, and we call attention to the necessity of securing further congressional aid for the removal of all barriers to the exchange of com-

mercial products with the markets of the world.

Resolved, That we pledge the nominees of the state Republican ticket to a prudent, efficient and economical administration of the business of the state and the enforcement of all laws upon the statute books.

Resolved, That we extend our sincere sympathy to the stricken people of our sister state of California and commend the prompt relief tendered them in their recent hour of calamity.
