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ESSENTIALLY DIFFERENT.

The democratic press is very busy just now trying to have the people believe two things: First, that the President and the leaders of the republican party are at serious variance on nearly every public question. Second, that W. J. Bryan and Roosevelt hold, practically, to the same principles and policies.

Concerning the first, what are the facts? In the senate a few republican senators, believed to be under the control of certain great corporations, opposed the efforts of their own party in that body, acting in harmony with the President, to control these corporations. In their efforts they had the active and persistent aid of the democratic minority. Instead of being opposed by the leaders of the party the President has met only the opposition of the corporations he sought to control and that of an obstructive democratic minority engaged in playing very cheap politics. The same conditions prevail in the house, with this exception; there the republican majority is so great that it is able to sweep factious opposition easily aside. The real, trusted leaders of the republican party, the party at large and the President are at one in purpose. If there be any would-be-leader in opposition he is forced to accept the aid of a mischievous and discredited minority before he can make his opposition of even so much potency as attaches to mere selfish obstruction. The republican party and President Roosevelt are not under any sort of necessity to look to such men for leadership.

So far as personal similarity between the man Bryan and the man Roosevelt is concerned it is more imaginary than real. The truth is they are radically and essentially of different mould. This is easily seen when the political principles and policies of the men are placed in contrast.

Bryan was and yet is, for any declaration to the contrary, the great apostle of the free, unlimited coinage of silver at an arbitrary ratio. He traveled up and down through the country eloquently declaiming against the "cross of silver and the crown of gold," and earnestly persuading men that there is no immorality in paying a dollar's indebtedness with half a dollar.

The latest utterance of Mr. Bryan on the subject declares he is in favor of government ownership of transportation, fuel, food supplies, etc. He would have the government own and operate railways, coal mines, grain warehouses, and other agencies of supply and distribution.

This is not republican doctrine, neither is it good American doctrine. These are identical. Control, government control in the interests of the whole people, of everything which menaces their prosperity, their happiness, health and life which may not otherwise be controlled by themselves, this is the doctrine of the republican party. A republican president in harmony with the whole party is demonstrating to the satisfaction of the American people that control is entirely feasible. "Teddy is making good."

Life is made up of small things, not of great ones. The world teems with the little thoughts, words and deeds of the masses rather than with the brilliant achievements of an occasional genius, or the daring victories of a few splendid warriors.

It is not the overwhelming

dignity and courtesy displayed by the rich or titled on occasions of state that weave the threads of true friendship into a fabric that time and eternity cannot destroy; rather is it the simple act of kindness, the little gift of love, the earnest word of sympathy, that sheds the glow of real happiness all about and brings to the individual the peace that abides.
