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ELECTIONS.

The struggle for supremacy which has taken place between the two great political parties in many of the states of our Union, generally showed republican gains, although a small vote was secured in many localities where was waged the greatest contention.

The republican vote fell much short of the numbers two years ago. The press dispatches indicate that Mr. Hughes is elected governor of New York over Mr. Hearst, the democratic candidate. The legislature of New York will be strangely republican.

Before the last presidential election Mr. Hearst spent money so plentifully to get nomination in his party for president, that it impressed many that he was endeavoring to obtain the nomination by use of large sums of money. The same feeling prevails in reference to his late effort to be elected governor of the state of New York.

These are Governors.

In the election this week Hughes was elected governor of New York and the following were elected governors of other states:

James W. Gillett, rep., Calif.; Charles O. Stockslager, dem., Idaho; Curtis Gould Jr., rep., Massachusetts; Edwin S. Stuart rep., Penn.; Albert B. Cummins, rep., Iowa; Elmore V. Sarles, rep., North Dakota; James O. Davidson, rep., Wis.; Bryant B. Brooks, rep., Wyo.; Edward W. Hoch, rep., Kansas; John A. Johnson, dem., Minn.; and it is claimed that Geo. L. Sheldon, rep., was elected in Nebraska by an increased majority over the election of two years ago. It is claimed the republicans have elected 201 members of congress and the democrats 153 with 32 missing districts to hear from.

The Citizens' League.

The Benton County Citizens' League met Tuesday evening at the usual hour. The meeting was called promptly to order by President B. W. Johnson.

There were considerable numbers of the members present. During the meeting much important business was transacted. A committee was appointed to ask the county court to appropriate a reasonable sum of money to enable the League officers to place proper advertisements showing the advantages and resources of the county. Last year the county court appropriated under the act of the legislature passed giving such authority, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. The result of this advertising brought about twenty-five hundred letters of inquiry and afterwards quite a number of people came after their letters and bought homes in the county. A committee was also appointed to take up the subject of making the locks at Oregon City free.

A committee was appointed to look after and guard the interests of Benton county during the session of the next legislature. Another committee was appointed to consider the propriety of and suggest the means and measures to reorganize the Citizens' League on the plans usually conducted by a commercial club and to formulate and report plans to procure and equip proper rooms for their meetings upon social and business lines, and to be further considered by the League at its next regular meeting in December.
