WOOL INDUSTRY.

The production and imports of wool during recent years as shown by our sheep census, and the various prices of wool, will show more clearly than any explanation can convey, the benefits of protection.

Free wool has been made the special issue by free traders for many years. After various attempts were made we were given a tariff in 1894 that carried in its schedules free wool to our manufacturers. The result was that the sheep were killed, farmers could not get profitable prices for their wool; and during the operation of that tariff we imported from abroad over 800,000,000 pounds of wool, displacing, to that extent the American production.

Our manufacturers had free material, and yet many of these mills were closed or running on half time, their hands were idle and dividends were not declared. We are now recovering from the disastrous effect which followed to both manufacturer and sheep raiser by the free tariff on wool which was in operation from 1894 to 1897.

FACTS WORTH CONSIDERING

Since the effect of a protective tariff has again become thoroughly distributed, production has been unequalled; its value has reached the highest figure yet attained; the value of the Farmers' National surplus still maintains the magnitude that has built up the balance of trade by successive additions for many years to change the nation from a borrower into a lender.

The unprecedented savings have embarrassed farmers and others to find investments until the savings banks of the East have become over supplied with increased holdings of the people's savings. The farms of the country have increased in value to a fabulous extent. Farm crops have never before been harvested at such high general production and value. The partial failure of two or three second class crops makes no apparent impression upon the great aggregate of all crops. The increased surplus which has steadily been accumulating for the last several years and the investment of the same is primarily the reason for the increased improvement and development of the country everywhere.

A change in the existing policy of the Government to a law providing "tariff for revenue," "free wool" and other changes along these lines would transform as it by magic the existing development and prosperity to "soup houses," closed factories, unemployed millions and general stagnation and inactivity, suffering, loss of millions, and a backward tendency of the conditions of this country as instanced by former unprosperous conditions, suffering, and the unemployed.
