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GOVERNMENT INVESTIGATES.

Many things are happening these days to incline one to the idea that there is a tendency toward centralization of governmental power in the United States.

Just why the webs which Dan Cupid spent so many hours of labor and love to weave should have been cut and slashed so ruthlessly by various judges throughout the land is what the government proposes to find out.

The desire for this data is based upon the idea of more uniform divorce laws in the various states. In order that the government may accomplish its purpose clerks will visit every state in the union and copy the divorce records of every court within said state.

In fact, much work has already been done under governmental orders in some of the eastern states, and a dozen or more are expected to arrive in Oregon sometime during the present month.

Maitman will be the first Oregon county to have her divorce court records investigated and the investigation will cover a period of twenty years back.

All features of the various suits for divorce, whether "just ordinary" or sensational in the extreme, are to be published in the reports of the Department of Commerce and Labor. The investigation was started upon the recommendation of President Roosevelt in one of his messages to congress.

We fancy that after the publication of these suits for divorce begins the reports of the Department of Commerce and Labor will be read regularly, early and late, and by all classes, even by intellectual people. It is safe to predict that the first few editions will run short—but the department will soon "get next."

"A Thousand Nights' Entertainment!" Here is promised data which shall cause the glories of the "Arabian Nights" to fade into insignificance. Whether incompatibility of temper, the use of intoxicating liquors or infidelity shall prove the reason for the suit for divorce most frequently unearthed by the investigating committee remains to be seen.

It will be interesting to learn whether men or women are the more frequent petitioners for escape from the yoke that binds.

SAYS NEVER AGAIN.

William Randolph Hearst says he's had enough. If he sticks to this sentiment there will be a feeling of intense relief experienced by the masses irrespective of political affiliations and echo will answer far and near, "Good enough!" Willie is in command of scant respect at the hands of his fellows, even among those who know him best.

In California, the state where he made his home for so many years, and where he has great properties, he is blessed with a large army of decriers. Willie is politically dead, but he died hard and none to soon. Had one counseled with his nostrils he would have declared that political death has gathered the boy to his Fathers some time since.

On January 3 Willie Randolph sang his swan song, which reads as follows: "I myself am not and will not again be a candidate for any office, but I am as much interested as ever—and even more interested than ever—in the promotion

of the principles of the Independent League. It seems to me that we can feel satisfaction upon what has been accomplished. And it seems to me, as patriotic citizens, we need care particularly what individuals do the principle and reform into effect long as they actually be accomplished to the benefit of our fellow citizens.

Taking into consideration that because Willie dragged the League about by the tail he finally forced it to nominate him for governor of New York, thus making it a party to his political death, it will be seen that there is in his latest statements to the public much evidence of forgiveness on his part. Rest in peace!
