What an Egg Is.

The average weight of a hen's egg is two ounces, containing nearly 200 grains of solids, divided as follows: Ten parts shell, sixty parts white, thirty parts yolk. White of egg consists of about 14 per cent egg albumen and 86 per cent water. There is some fat in it; also salt, chiefly chlorides. Egg albumen and the albumen of meat coagulate at the temperature of 163 de grees F. The yolk consists principally of fat, coloring matter and water; 52 per cent is water. It contains also grape sugar and salts, chiefly phosphates and iron compounds.
