CONVENES TODAY.

Y. W. C. A. Convention—Occurs in Corvallis—The Program.

The largest number of student delegates ever entertained in Corvallis will be here today in attendance at the state convention of the college Y. W. C. A.

The hospitable people of the city have thrown open their doors and the 125 delegates will be made heartily welcome.

The earnest young christians will come from the U. of O. and Eugene High School, Willamette University, the Drain, Ashland and Monmouth Normals, Albany College, Chemawa Indian School, Dallas College, Philomath, McMinnville and Newberg colleges, the Newberg High School, Pacific University, and from two city associations, Portland and Salem.

Many bright and able speakers will be present and a feast of good things intellectual will be a feature of the convention. Among the prominent speakers will be: Miss Constance McCorkle, Francis Gage, state secretary; Mrs. J. W. Honeyman, Miss Francis Isom, city librarian; Mary Montgomery, president of the Consumers' League; Mrs. Lola Baldwin, secretary Travelers' Aid; Mrs. M. R. Trumbull, secretary child labor commission; Mrs. G. Holmes Laurence, president of Holmes' Business College; Mrs. Reno B. Hutchinson, Miss Watson and Mrs. C. T. Tinker, all of Portland; Mrs. August G. Stacey of Seattle; Miss Julia Frasier, Pacific Coast secretary of the W. B. M. of the Presbyterian church; President McGrew of Newberg College and Dean Kimball of the Willamette Theological seminary.

The convention opens in college chapel at 9 a. m. this morning and the complete program for the three days is as follows:

Organization. Devotional exercises led by Miss McCorkle; Bible study, Mrs. Stacey of Seattle; 11 a. m. meeting with students in college chapel; greetings to the convention delegates by President Gatch; response, Mrs. Honeyman.

Immediately after dinner today the visitors will go sight-seeing in and about OAC. At 2:30 devotional, Miss McCorkle; Bible study, Mrs. Stacey; reports of Associations; Address, "The Consumers' League," Miss Montgomery; "Child Labor," Mrs. Trumbull; Library Work as a Profession," Miss Isom; "Library Commission," Miss Marvin of Salem.

This evening in chapel there will be an address, "Alien or American," by Miss Julia Frasier, of San Francisco; "The College Woman's Opportunity," by President McGrew, Newberg.

Saturday morning: Devotional, Miss McCorkle; Bible study, Mrs. Stacey; reports of state officers; finance hour. Saturday afternoon: devotional, Miss McCorkle; Bible study, Mrs. Stacey; "Travelers' Aid," Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin; student conference led by Mrs. C. T. Tinker; city conference, Mrs. Gertrude Holmes Laurence.

Sunday a. m. the "Work for Women" will be presented in the various churches of the city. Sunday afternoon, "In the Domain of the Turk," an address to women only, will be given by Miss Francis G. Gage. In the evening a union service of all the churches will occur in the armory. "The Christian Athlete," the convention sermon, will be delivered by Dean Kimball of Salem. The farewell service will be led by Miss Gage.

Original Plan Adopted.

A novel plan to secure a successful cannery has been adopted by the company, which is installing a cannery at Brownsville, which will be the first industry of the kind in Linn county, is being installed by Ed Holloway and Oren Stratton, of Brownsville and H. A. Lewis, of Portland. The old tannery building near the Southern Pacific depot will be remodeled and the machinery for the plant, which has been ordered, will be installed there as soon as it arrives.

the land so acquired shall be devoted to raising produce for the cannery. Plenty of good material of the kind desired is thus assured in addition to what shall be furnished from farms and it is planned to increase the size of the plant as conditions demand.

The new cannery at Brownsville, which will be the first industry of the kind in Linn county, is being installed by Ed Holloway and Oren Stratton, of Brownsville and H. A. Lewis, of Portland. The old tannery building near the Southern Pacific depot will be remodeled and the machinery for the plant, which has been ordered, will be installed there as soon as it arrives.

The new plant will begin operating this summer. Some marketable fruits will be canned, but the chief attention this season will be devoted to tomatoes and beans. Other vegetables will be added to the output later. The spirit with which the cannery starts in Brownsville is illustrated by the fact that a bonus of \$1000 was raised for it in 48 hours.

"CHRISTOPHONE" INSTALLED.

Church Services Now Held by Phone in Albany.

The Albany Herald of Wednesday says:

"Conversions by telephone will be made possible in Albany commencing with next Sunday. The time has passed when it is necessary to attend church to get the benefit of the minister's sermon, or to enjoy the music of trained choirs.

"Albany will be the first city on the Pacific coast to have one of its churches equipped with the Christophone. Manager DeVarney of the home company is now engaged in installing this wonderful invention in the United Presbyterian church and expects to have it in working order by Sunday morning. Speaking on the subject last night Mr. DeVarney said that the Christophone was one of the latest inventions in the telephone line, and while it has been tried in one or two places in the United States with success, it is yet in the nature of an experiment. If the Christophone is found to prove successful in the United Presbyterian church, Mr. DeVarney states that he will endeavor to install the instruments in all the houses of worship in the city.

"The Christophone," said Mr. DeVarney "is designed especially for the convenience of patients in hospitals and any persons who are unable to attend church. We will probably put in suitable apparatus in the hospital here so that the patients can have the benefit of hearing a church service with no inconvenience on their part.

It this initial experiment proves successful, and Christophones are installed in all the churches, Albany will only have to call "Central" and ask to be connected with the church of their choice to realize the benefit of a religious service.

A temporary set back was received by the members of the Linn county grange when it was discovered that the referendum petitions which have been circulated by the members of the Linn county grange on the University of Oregon appropriation were of no effect. Altogether about 500 names were signed to the referendum petition, and because the ones circulating the petitions failed to sign the petitions, enclosing the names signed, and stating to the best of their belief the petitions were legal voters in the state, the petitions signed thus far are not in accordance with the law, and it is necessary to begin over once more in securing names to the petition. The members of the grange are not discouraged in the least, however, and are determined to begin once more to secure the required number of names to the petition in Linn county.—Yesterday's Albany Herald.

LET HORSE SHOW COME.

It Means Much to Corvallis and Benton—Farmers Interested.

Isn't it about time to begin planning for another horse show for Corvallis? If not, why not?

The horse show last year was one of the biggest affairs from several standpoints, ever held in Corvallis, and its results are still noticeable in this city and Benton county. Not only did it bring together an immense crowd for two days and interest old and young, men and women, as they were never before interested in fine horses; but it attracted the attention of the entire state and of neighboring states to the horses of Benton county. The result has been that horse buyers have been constant visitors to the county ever since, paying prices for desirable animals that have made glad the hearts and fat the purses of all farmers with such stock for sale.

This year many farmers in Benton have young animals that are in prime condition for exhibition purposes, and they are naturally beginning to wonder if Corvallis is going to give them an opportunity to display these animals.

The horse show means money to the farmer, because many horse buyers will. It is certain, come to the show and pay big prices on the spot for prize winners and other desirable horses. When the farmers prosper, the merchants, grocers and the entire community also prosper. When the town receives such advertising as a horse show gives it, near and far, it is detrimental that the news will travel and bear fruit.

Therefore, it behooves Corvallis horsemen, those who so successfully planned and carried to fulfillment the big horse show last year, to get busy and agitate this important matter. Already several farmers have been making inquiries and are eager for information on the subject. If deemed advisable, other fine stock might also be exhibited at the same time, as goat and other shows are held in neighboring towns with marked success. It has been sensibly suggested that no cash prizes be offered, as they are of little moment to the men who own fine horses and have plenty of money already. Rather let the money be invested in silver cups which can be suitably engraved and be kept as heirlooms in the family of lucky winners.

By all means let us have a horse show and let plans be formulated at an early date.

COMING TO THE FRONT.

And Found Capable—Facts About Women Mail Carriers.

No matter how badly some narrow-minded men hate to admit it, women are constantly forging to the front in almost every avenue of business and more than that, they are succeeding. They are day by day being promoted to positions of trust and importance and a leading minister of Portland declared in an address a few days ago that they are "more dependable" than men because they have no vicious habits to sap their vitality and weaken their mentality, in consequence of which they are trusted by their employers because of good character, clear-mindedness and safe judgment. The Portland Journal touches on this subject editorially and has the following to say of women as rural mail carriers:

"According to a report of the postoffice department, 253 women are now employed as carriers on rural mail routes, and four or five times that number, it is estimated, are on the rolls as substitute carriers. In many cases the wives of the carriers do

the work, and do it quite as well as their husbands would. A number of instances are on record of women going ahead with this work in the face of obstacles that would have stopped an ordinary man. During a recent storm in Pennsylvania a woman was the only carrier in that part of the country to start out on a route and complete the trip. She drove the entire way through drifts and over almost impassable roads and delivered the usual quota of mail. The postoffice department points to her record as one equalled by few men. There have been similar instances in this part of the country. The wife of a prisoner in the Multnomah county jail, sentenced to death for murder, is a mail carrier in the mountain region of Idaho, and though the mother of two young children performs her duty faithfully and devotes part of her meager salary to an effort to save her unworthy husband's life.

Fourth Assistant Superintendent McGraw says in his report: "We can depend upon the women to deliver the mail, no matter what the condition of the weather."
