Let It Remain.

Editor Gazette:
It is to be hoped that congress will retain the legend, "In God we trust," on the new coinage. It meant much when first placed there—much some yet living can never forget and of which the Nation should be constantly reminded, "lest we forget."

After seven days' fierce, bloody conflict the magnificent Army of the Potomac, the pride, boast and hope of the Union lay a crushed, bleeding, humiliated thing at Harrison's Landing. Pope's army was quickly driven in disastrous rout from the plains of Manassas. Antietam was little more than a fearful, unavailing sacrifice. Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville, the latter a veritable holocaust, followed.

The best appointed armies of the Union commanded by the most skillful and approved soldiers has been beaten off. Thousands, the flower of the young manhood of the country, lay mute in death, while other thousands, maimed and dying filled the hospitals. It was a dark, sorrowful period. The fairest, brightest hopes of men and women had been blasted and despair well nigh seized the bravest. What man, what army, what agency might now be trusted to bring victory? Little remained, or seemed to remain but the Cause. Surely that was just and must prevail. The religious spirit of the people was aroused. The firm resolve was made to fight on at whatever sacrifice, and trust the God of battles for final victory.

It was not the resolve of churchmen only but of every patriot who believed in the existence of a Supreme Being. It was a high, noble, righteous sentiment. No longer would men place their trust "in horsemen

and chariots and men of war" but in God. Let it be inscribed on the coin of the Nation that the world might know in whom we trusted and that we were not ashamed of it.

Read subsequent history. Possibly it teaches that we trusted not in vain. Why should we remove the legend? Have we ceased our trust? Is there no longer need to trust?

It is because infidelity sneers at it and the thoughtless fool makes mirth of it, for like reason we should destroy the decalogue and dethrone God.

It may be but sentiment, but it will betide the Nation when it becomes ashamed of the truth that once it was glad to say: "In God we trust."

Asks No Loan.

In the bill that will be introduced in congress at the forthcoming session appropriating \$1,175,000 for the United States government participation at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in 1909 there will be a section pledging the management to ask no loan from Uncle Sam to carry on the work of creating the fair.

The people behind the exposition believe they are fully capable of holding a successful world's fair without asking the government for any donation or any loan. All the management desires is that Uncle Sam participate in the same manner as the states and foreign nations will do by erecting buildings and installing therein a representative display.

Since the United States government began to patronize exhibitions to the present time Congress has appropriated \$28,752,251 for its representation. Only \$485,000 of this money has been spent west of the Rocky mountains, the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland, one of the most successful world's fairs ever held, receiving the benefit of this amount.

Making Experiments There.

The department of Engineering of the University of Oregon has begun a series of exhaustive tests on the strength and impermeability of concrete for building purposes and for the construction of dams and reservoirs. The ordinary water proof concrete is mixed in the proportion of one part of cement to two parts of sand and four of stone. If through electrolytic action, induced by the addition of a small percentage of clay, alum, or other agents, the approximate proportion can be changed to the ratio of one to three to six, it can easily be seen that a large saving can be made in the cost of materials since the cement is the expensive part of the wall.

Certain experiments already made have tended to show that concrete so mixed has both greater strength and greater impermeability. To determine whether or not this is true, some three or four hundred tests will be made, extending through the year, with varying definite amounts of electrolytic agents added. Each sample will be submitted to a water pressure test of from forty to one hundred pounds to the square inch, in addition to the regular compression tests. The department of chemistry is co-operating, and the most thorough work possible will be done. C. A. McLain and J. W. McArthur, of the department of engineering, will have charge of the tests.

Since the University has at present no money available for the carrying on of such work, the expenses will be borne by the men in charge.

IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE

In National Forest in Oregon—
Something About it.

The following letter is issued by the Forest Service, Washington, D. C.:

"The government will soon begin the construction of a trail and two wagon roads in the Fremont National Forest, Oregon. The trail will lead from Timothy Meadow Range Station to the top of Bald Mountain, a distance of 11.2 miles. The two roads are to be known as the Timothy Meadow and Forest wagon roads. The former will be extended from the terminus of the sawmill road leading from Silver Lake and will connect with Bald Mountain trail at Timothy Meadow Range Station, a distance of approximately four miles. This is a very important headquarters in the Fremont National Forest owing to the fact that it is situated on top of a mountain with an altitude of 8000 feet from which the entire Forest can be seen.

"The proposed Fremont Forest road will run from the sawmill road near Silver Lake and run in a generally southerly direction to its intersection with the proposed Forest road across Goose Lake National Forest. This road will be 37 miles in length and will tap a heavily timbered and grazing country and will connect five Range Stations. It will be of great assistance to stockmen in getting supplies to their camps and will shorten the distance between Silver Lake and Lakeview by ten miles."

Fuel in Portland.

It is the evident intention of the fuel dealers of this city to maintain the present retail prices of both wood and coal, which almost prohibits the working man from purchasing fuel. Yet he

must pay the price, cut his own wood, or go without.

Good grades of coal are selling for \$10 and \$10.50 a ton, while the best grade of coal on the market sells for \$14 a ton.

The same high prices prevail for slabwood and fir. To obtain dry slabwood of the meanest kind the householder must pay \$4.75 a load, which means about three-fourths of a cord. Block wood, or inside wood, comes higher. For the dry sawed fir \$7.50 a load is asked. The prices are for short hauls. Where it is necessary to take the wood to a distance the charge is higher.

The present prices are even higher than those asked last winter, when the silver thaw put the roads in bad condition for the hauling of heavy loads. But the present time, when labor is plentiful on account of the men laid off by the railroads, and when the streets are in the finest condition which the weather could make possible, the prices continue to soar.
