ITS IMMORALITY.

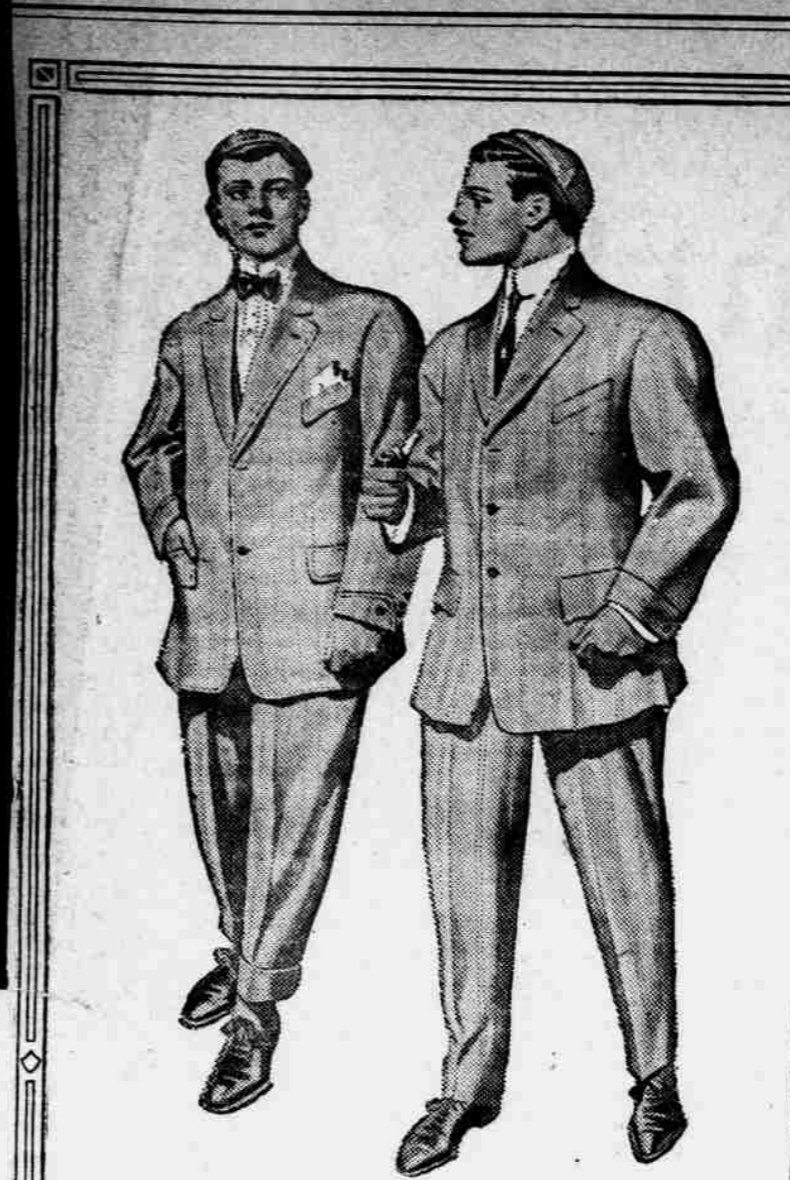
