## HIS PLATFORM.

A railway conductor, remonstrating with a passenger for standing on the platform said:—"Platforms are not for standing on but for getting in on." Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain, a candidate for United States Senator for Oregon has given to the world in general, and to Oregon republicans in particular the platform which he has framed for the purpose of "getting in on."

A few extracts from his platform will suffice, for the present, to show how difficult a task the governor had in framing a platform which should entice republicans, offend no democrat and serve his own unselfish, non-partisan ends—that is to get in on.

After the usual statement of impertunity by many from all parties to become a candidate he launches out:

"I believe firmly in the direct primary." If he did not so believe he'd be the only exception in Oregon. "I believe in the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people." Years ago Oregon, by the action of a republican legislature, officially expressed the desire of Oregonians that this method of choosing senators should be adopted. For many years the senators and representatives in congress from Oregon have favored and now favor this method. The governor has no advantage here over either Senator Fulton or Mr. Cake.

"To accomplish this no candidate should be elected to the legislature who does not unqualifiedly sign Statement No. 1."

George E. should hang on here; it is his best hold, but he has no monopoly of it. But this, he says, is the only issue. Has the tariff been revised, the currency system corrected and a score of things carried to completion along republican lines as they should be? Republicans see that there are other issues, vital issues of greater moment than this. Can the President and the Republican party be better served by a non-partisan senator who is a Democrat than by an earnest, tried and true Republican?

Mr. Chamberlain would have us believe so, for, from his own language we gather that no Republican, even though he has imbibed his Republican principles with his mother's milk, can be in more perfect accord with the President than he, the non-partisan Democrat Geo. E. Chamberlain. Hear him; "The President of the United States and the Democratic and Republican masses are in accord on all vital issues. As a result the President has antagonized large numbers of his own party."

Truly this is a most unusual result of accord. But then the accord of the Democratic masses compensates for the antagonism of such "large numbers of his own party." Of course the Democratic party lines right up squarely with the President and supports him and his policies. That is what the Democratic party sends Senators to congress for. What man of any party in Oregon is in such perfect accord with the President as Mr. Chamberlain?

He says "I have been in hearty accord with most of the policies of the President." This tense, "have been," is not satisfactory. We are not ignorant of what sort

of accord he has shown in the past with men and measures known as Republican, but since he seeks Republican support he should plainly state the present measure of his accord. Is it full, fair, frank, earnest accord based on life-long devotion to Republican principles? Not for a moment do we believe it. Then what policies does he exclude from "hearty accord" by the phrase "most policies?" These, in the opinion of Republicans, may be vital issues. He certainly should explain these things at large to Republicans. Will he do so? Probably not until he is sworn in as Senator from Oregon.

But if he goes to the United States Senate it will be because the members of the legislature have no discretion in the matter, and must support him, even though it violate the conscience of every member. It is necessary that Senators respect and obey the will of the people. The Governor is very earnest on this matter. "There is no other issue before the people" he assures us.

He has us almost persuaded that he alone, if elected, would consult the people in all things and obsequiously bow to their will. We are all most convinced he would refer the style of his clothes and the brand of his whiskey to the will of the people—the dear, abused, senatorially deviled people. But, hold!

If elected, "I will support those measures, whether of a Republican or Democratic administration which my conscience approves." We do not quarrel with the Governor for this. They all do so, or should do so. Possibly the members of the legislature should do. When conscience enters the arena argument may cease. Yet, indeed, the governor should say what kind his conscience is. Is it "void of offense toward God and man?" Is it "seared as with a hot iron," or is it the elastic, India rubber sort which best serves a non-partisan Democrat when angling for Republican votes?

With a hint to Harry Murphy, we think, could the Colossus of Rhodes have seen it he would have jumped down, beaten at his own art by the greater straddle of our Governor, with one foot resting on the Democratic Jackass, and the other lightly planted on the Republican Elephant.

## POLICE JUDGE.

With the enviable record he has made as an officer our people will regret to see Mr. J. F. Yates step out of the office of Police Judge at the end of his present term. Since 1895 he has held the office, having twice been elected, and had he not refused to stand as a candidate it is highly probable he would have been re-elected without opposition for the third term.

It is seldom we see a man hold such a position without making many enemies, but when Fred put the trimmings on an offender he did it in such easy, graceful and dignified manner, always tempering justice with mercy, that none seemed to take offense. Malice never enters into his rulings and in all the trying circumstances his well balanced mental faculties have been equal to the occasion. The fact that that the City Council, without solicitation on his part, and certainly presuming he would be a candidate for re-election, raised the salary of the office, shows their appreciation of his services. We believe that when a man makes a good officer it is the duty of the people to say so as it is always an incentive to his successor to emulate his example and keep step with the rapid growth of the town.

Now that Mr. Yates has honorably retired as a prospective candidate, suggestions naturally come to our minds as to his successor. As indicated by Mr. Yates in his retiring card, the office of Police Judge has grown to be a question of vital importance to the city and it "should furnish the holder of this position an office separate from a private business, at the City Hall,

and install proper files and other equipments which will enable him to more conveniently care for the increasing work of the office." This will not only require a man of clerical ability but one well versed in law, and to our mind we could not find a man more peculiarly fitted for this important position than G. W. Denman. For twelve years he has filled his present position as County School Superintendent, not only spending his entire time in the work, but also the principal part of his salary in the cause of education. He has made one of the best Superintendents in the State and placed the schools of this county on such an advanced plane that it will make his successor hustle to maintain the present high standard of excellence.

While some of us were asleep George studied law and will be admitted to the bar at the next term of court and hence he is legally well qualified. His record of doing things in the past is ample assurance of his ability to make a good Police Judge.

## NO ANSWER FROM FULTON.

In his Corvallis speech last June Senator Fulton made the declaration that if he did not receive the popular indorsement in June he would not be a candidate before the legislature. In view of the activity of his partisans in the state against Statement No. 1, The Journal had its Washington correspondent ask Senator Fulton if he still stands by that declaration, and his answer thereto was "I am not making any statements now." This refusal to reiterate his declaration, together with the opposition of his Oregon friends to Statement No. 1, raises the question, if, after all, the Fulton movement has not had its ultimate in an attempted legislative election instead of popular choice. The plan of some of his friends of accepting a candidate if he be all right politically has its wide tendency toward promoting a complexity that will after all throw the choice into the legislature.—McMinville Register.
