

Our Dead Presidents.—A review of the lives of the different Presidents of the United States is productive of very interesting results. For instance, three of them died on the Fourth of July. John Adams and Jefferson died on the country's birthday, July 4, 1826, and Monroe died on the 28th of June, 1831. Madison died on the 28th of June, 1835, and his friends were confident, that, he too, would live until July 4th. If he had, then the second, third, fourth and fifth Presidents would have died on Independence day. Taylor and Andrew Johnson both died in July. Every fourth President until Mr. Hayes time, was an old bachelor. Van Buren did not draw any of his salary until his term expired, when he drew it out in gold, "all in a heap." Tyler died poor, having gone into the rebellion, and was one of the Confederate Commissioners at Montgomery. John Quincy Adams lived the longest; he was 90 years old when he died. Madison, was 85; Jefferson, 83; John Q. Adams, 81: Van Buren, 80; Jackson, 78; Buchanan, 77; Filmore, 74; Monroe, 72; Tyler, 72; Harrison, 68; Washington, 67; Johnson, 67; Pierce, 55; Taylor, 60; Lincoln, 56; Polk, 64. General Grant is the only living ex-president. Tyler and Van Buren both died in 1862. Lincoln in 1865, Buchanan in 1868, Pierce in 1869, Fillmore in 1874 and Johnson in 1874.
