STAGE ROBBER.

The United States Mail and Wells Fargo & Co's Treasure Box Taken.

A week ago last Wednesday night as one of the California and Oregon stages was crossing the Siskiyou mountains, about seven miles from the dividing line of Oregon and California, the driver, Mr. Nort. Eddings, was stopped by a robber, who pointed a gun at him and demanded Wells Fargo & Co's treasure box, which contained at the time \$1000, and also the mail. Mr. Eddings told him that he could not give him the express box as it was chained to the stage. He then ordered Mr. Eddings to hold his horse. The robber then went into the brush, and was heard to whisper to someone therein. When he returned from the brush he brought with him an axe, and proceeded to chop the chain away that held the treasure box, and took the mail sacks also. Then he fired his gun into the air, and ordered the driver to proceed on his journey.

We learn that the sheriff of Jackson county, Mr. Ryboe, immediately started in pursuit of the robbers, and has been successful in tracking them to Lakewick. The supposition is that there are three connected with the robbery, although only one was seen by the driver.

Two or three years ago a stage was robbed very near the same locality.

This stage robbery is getting very monotonous for the people of Southern Oregon. If the robbers are caught this time a little "hemp-dip" would be a mild medicine.
