OREGON LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE.
SALISBURY, Oct. 6.—The House met at 9:30
o'clock. Journal of yesterday was read
and approved.

H. R. 49, regulating the fees of Sher-
iff's clerks, was reported back by the
Committee on Courts. After striking
out sec. 6, the report was amended, ex-
cepting Grant, Columbia and Wasco
Counties, and adopted.

The committee have them in charge
reported favorably on H. R. 46, 23, 21,
45, 27, 19, 20 and 22, and against the pas-
sage of H. R. 20 and 23.

The Committee on Commerce reported
favorably on H. R. 21, as a substitute for
H. R. 22, regarding the salmon fisheries.
The substitute was read twice.

SENATE.
The Senate met at 10 A. M.; a quorum
present. The Journal of yesterday
was approved.
