A NEW CHIEF.

The question of the appointment of a new chief signal officer to succeed General Myer must soon receive the consideration of the president. The service is a peculiar one; a part of the permanent army establishment in time of peace is employed in civil duties of great practical value and growing importance. The temper of the country has been ascertained on the suggestion of the American Association for the Advancement of Science to transfer the meteorological duties to the treasury or interior departments, and it is recognized that the people wish no change which might, in releasing it from military discipline, prove disastrous to its usefulness. The signal service is a special service and its duties require special study, as do the duties of the engineer or ordnance corps. The subject of practical meteorology is one requiring years of intelligent study, and a proper application of its principles to the local weather conditions of the United States can only be acquired by long experience. This knowledge to-day is only possessed by the officers of the signal corps. The selection of a chief signal officer should not be made as a reward for military services, however brilliant. Such an appointment would not deserve the confidence of the country and it would in time react upon itself. Here is an important opportunity for the president to illustrate his views, which heralded the advent of his administration, on the reform of the civil service by selecting for the succession some one of the officers who have proved their competency by years of successful work, who are conversant with the details and present needs of the service and whose intelligent labor greatly aided the genius of General Myer in perfecting it. The signal service depends for its reputation and for a generous support from the people on its recognized value as pecuniary aid to the commercial, agricultural and other great industrial interests of the country, and such interests rather than the purely military should be consulted in the selection of the new chief signal officer.

The Pope is not inclined to meddle with the Irish land troubles. The clerical organ, Osservatore Romano, announces that numerous inquiries have reached the Vatican from Ireland as to the attitude which the Pope intends to observe in reference to the troubles in that country, and remarks with regard to avoid all interference in the political affairs of nations, and has always recommended the clergy not to depart from their mission of peace. The Pope, it adds, quite recently again exhorted the bishops to keep strictly within the limits prescribed by the laws in which they were severally located whenever any question of internal order or policy should arise.

The seat of plutonium empire in California is now fully established in Alameda county, and the manufacture of powerful combustibles would seem to have attracted more attention there than in any earthly locality of the same extent to which we know of. The water front in the vicinity of San Pablo and West Berkeley contains six patent powder manufactories, including nitro-glycerine and grant-powder, a coal oil factory, two chemical works and a sulphur mill. This combination cannot be excelled outside of Tophet for the production of materials necessary to rend mountains or level cities.

The newspapers generally condemn Gov. Thayer, for his refusing in his thanksgiving proclamation, to acknowledge the existence of God. The newspapers are right. Gov. Thayer has no right to insult a christian people living under a government. When Gov. Thayer writes such proclamations he but attempts to play the part of Bob Ingersoll, with Ingersoll's brain left out.
