It was good and consistent on the part of Judge Fitzhugh when he wrote in the scroll of the eagle on the poster calling for the Democratic county convention—"No Chinese need apply." He expressed his sentiments.

Elsewhere we give the names of the Republican nominees for county officers. Every man is known to the amount of his worth who holds a place on the ticket. As to them we have only this to say: There are one or two strong and good men on the ticket, and yet every one of them will have a heavy load to carry when it comes to the rest of the ticket.

He was but a colored man; and yet he had common sense and he said: "Well, I have been down South; I was born there. I honored Mr. Lincoln; I know he liked my people, and he worked well for their emancipation. We were promised many favors by the Republican party and many favors Mr. Lincoln gave us. But we are freemen now, and some of us have been voting the Democratic ticket lately, and the Chinaman is, according to Arthur's veto, better suited to work the cane and cotton fields than those born there. And I won't stand that. We may be black; but we have a right to say we have honest hearts in our bosoms. Perhaps Arthur and his friends want to make voters of the Chinese."

The assertion has been made that no Republican in Oregon could endorse Arthur's veto. It is untrue. A Republican paper gets in as follows:

Just now the Democrats are tearing their hair and shouting wildly. What is the trouble? Drunk, soaked or mad dogs? No, they are running from the Chinese, and with good reason. In true heathen style, they are making all this uproar, hoping thereby to deceive the public and frighten a few timid people into voting the Democratic ticket. It will not work. It is "too much" for the people who want to know you know why this is thus? They will soon be wanting to know why so many Democrats employ Chinamen? This is what no fellow can find out and what no Democrat can explain. I will not do to give Democracy's explanation—that "this is a feather in the hat" and while leaning for a better explanation, they may set out the awful fact that many Democrats and Republicans are hiring the heathens. If the giddy leaders are not careful the Chinese question will be too much for them. Like every other question with which they have wrestled for years, the party only weighs about sixty pounds, but always takes hold of a question weighing a ton with the utmost confidence. Of course the party always gets a hurt.

The paper uttering the above detectible sentiments is the property of a Republican by the name of Kineaid, and he having been a stalwart from the beginning—a pap-sucker—it is not to be wondered at that he stands by his party and against the laboring white classes of the Pacific slope.

The Portland Mercury is a dirty sheet—else to wreak the vengeance, to spleen, the nastiness of one bad man against another so widely known to be an honest man, it would not have permitted to have appeared in its columns a slanderous, stinking article under the caption of "Sneaking Slanderer." That article was written by a party who lives in Roseburg, and yet it was dated at Oakland; and consequently that article bears upon its face the word liar—an epithet no honest man would ever have uttered so long as he had a good right arm to assert his manhood. The time for forbearance has ceased as a virtue. There can and should be no compromise with a false witness. When a man is a false witness against his neighbor and his neighbor's people should only be allowed a drum-head court-martial.

The party accused of writing a certain truthful article for this paper is innocent. We have the proof. That bad man Kelly has the proof. That bad Kelly wrote the article grumbled at—that is the truth—and he stands personally ready, always ready to back what he publishes—no take back here.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. S. K. Raymond, and on motion Hon. Binger Hermann was elected chairman, J. W. Strange secretary and J. Home assistant secretary. The chairman appointed as tellers Messrs. W. A. Croxon and S. K. Raymond.

N. Cocklerose was called to the chair and Hon. Binger Hermann introduced the following resolutions, which, on motion, were unanimously adopted: Resolved, by the Republicans of Deer Creek precinct, in primary assembled: That we learn with profound regret of the veto of the anti-Chinese bill by Chester, A. Arthur, the acting President of the United States, so much in opposition to the well known views of the Republican administration of the late lamented President Garfield; and

Resolved, that the Republican party has ever shown itself to be the friend and protector of the industrial interests of the nation, and the trusty advocate of the poor man, and

Resolved, that the said veto meets with our unqualified disapproval, and we denounce it as unwise and condemn the policy which prompted it, and

Resolved, that we hereby express our most sincere commendation to all the representatives in congress from the Pacific coast, and especially to our energetic representative, Hon. M. C. George, for their untiring advocacy of the Chinese bill, and their firm stand in representing the unanimous feeling of the Republicans of this coast and State.

On motion it was ordered that the polls be kept open until 3:30 o'clock. On motion it was ordered that the names of all persons who vote at this primary meeting, shall record their names with the clerk.

On motion it was ordered that the nominees receiving the largest number of votes be declared the choice of the convention.

On a ballot being taken the following persons were declared the choice of the convention: J. W. Dowell, Oley Boon, N. Cocklerose, G. W. Jones, W. R. Ch. Noweth, Wm. McBea, John Gillebrieve, N. Imbler, Wm. Parrot, R. B. Dixon, David Hunter, Jas. Velzan, C. W. Smith, Timothy Ford, Marshal Ingraham.

On motion Messrs. A. R. Flint and N. Cocklerose were duly nominated for justices of the peace and P. C. Snider and David Hunter for constables of Deer Creek precinct.

There being no further business the meeting, on motion adjourned sine die. J. W. STRANGE, Sec. Roseburg, Oregon, April 8th, 1882.
