THE CITY WATER WORKS.

Some time ago the city completed arrangements to more effectually guard against loss by fire. The piece of ground on Bowen's hill occupied by some springs was rented by the city for ten years at a cost of one hundred dollars per year.

The excavation for the reservoir has been completed at a cost of \$475, and in dimensions it is thirty-four feet square at top, thirty at bottom and twenty feet deep. The contract for brick and cementing it has been let to Mr. Snooks for \$180, and is at present having brick, sand, etc., to fulfill the contract.

The estimated cost of the entire works is about \$2,500. We are very glad to see that something has been done to avert the danger of total destruction of our city by fire, and to lessen the percentage of insurance. It is quite remarkable that we have escaped the ravages of the fire so well.

The total loss is estimated to be \$400,000.

The city was also making provisions for a town hall in the meantime, all proper provision for combatting a fire was utterly neglected. The losses are pretty well covered by insurance.
