ROSEBURG, SATURDAY, SEPT. 30. NEW YORK CONVENTIONS.

As the State of New York is an empire itself, its political movements are of interest to the whole United States. The conflict which occurs in November next, may determine which party will control the next Congress.

"Defeated or victorious the Republican party of New York" has received a blow in the house of its friends which is purely gratuitous, trifling with its strength, and which will do more than anything which has happened in the last ten years to diminish its capacity for growth and to leave it without the sympathy or respect of those who looked to it as an exponent of political morality and the champion of political reform.

The Democratic convention met at Syracuse on the 21st. Lester B. Faulkner was selected for permanent Chairman. The chairman of committee on contested seats reported the committee had recognized the county democracy as the regular delegation from New York city, but with a view to the success of the party at the polls and for the purpose of securing entire harmony, they decided that the New York representation be divided as follows: County democracy 36, members of Tammany 24, Irving hall 10. The report was unanimously adopted amid vociferous applause.

The Democratic journals are enthusiastic over their ticket, while Republicans in considering their own are lukewarm or indignant.

THE EGYPTIAN WAR.

No more brilliant campaign than that of General Wolsey against the Egyptians has ever been recorded in history. Having prepared his plans with a degree of secrecy which was very remarkable in this age of telegraphs, he struck Arabi's army at Tel-el-Kebir, at 4.30 A. M. of the 12th inst., and having turned his flank doubled him up with comparatively small loss. The Egyptian force fell into his hands, including Arabi Pasha himself. The British forces entered into Cairo and the bulk of the army of invasion is about to return home. The future complications which were predicted are not likely to occur at present. The war is over.

It is touching indeed to see such gentlemen as Vic. Trevitt, L. F. Lane, W. H. Watkind, Jim Hendershott, Bill Cosper, and a host more, taking so deep an interest in Salem in the affairs of the Republican party. These estimable Democrats are for Mitchell, of course. They form his Democratic lobby, and are expected to steer Democratic votes into the Mitchell fold. No wonder many Republican members are replete under this sort of "co-operation."

BEN BUTLER was nominated by the Democratic State convention on the 19th, as Governor of Massachusetts. Bold Ben has been fighting for the place for several years, and it would be a good joke on the Pilgrim fathers if he should be elected.

IT MUST be an encouragement to the political hopes of successful corruptionists in the United States to know that George M. Robeson has been unanimously nominated for Congressman by the Republicans of the first district of New Jersey.

THE DESERTERS.

A deserter by the military law, is shot with the very short ceremony of a drum-head court martial. Unfortunately, in the civil service the same course does not prevail. An army of Democrats in Oregon who are fighting for everything that is dear to them, resistance to monopoly, resistance to the tariff, who have thrown down the gage of battle in behalf of labor and the rights of the people against organized capital, having succeeded in spite of money and promises in electing thirty-three members of the State Legislature, had a right to expect them to remain faithful to their duty. It is with pain and sorrow we have to confess that four men elected as Democrats, have deserted their colors and fled to the camp of the enemy. We regret the absence of military law on this occasion, but upon consideration, the political code is more effective. It does not kill, it tortures. These men who have betrayed the solemn trust confided to them will ever bear the mark of traitor upon their brows, and we take pleasure in handing them down to posterity that their names be not forgotten. The deserters are: J. M. SIGLIN of Coos and Curry, Wm. SPERS of Josephine, W. A. CURTIS of Baker and JOHN LONG of Lane.

If anything could be said in defense of these men, the Democrats of their different districts would be glad to hear it. The plea that the Democrats would prefer Mitchell to any other Republican, is frivolous. The rank and file of the party are sufficiently advised to know that a vacancy in the United States Senate is preferable to the election of any Republican. The election of Mitchell may give the control of the United States Senate to the Stalwart wing of the Republican party. Does any Democrat desire such a result? A vacancy may give the control of the next Senate to the Democrats. Under these circumstances we can have no patience with a Democratic member who will vote with either faction. All this twaddle about the popularity of Mitchell is pure nonsense. He has none in the State outside of the ring of federal officers and the few men of broken reputations whose fealty is secured at a very moderate price. In this county, which is Republican by 150 majority, it had not been strenuously denied that the Legislative delegation was fixed for Mitchell every Democratic candidate would have been elected, and there is no sensible man of either party who is not aware of this fact.

We have no attack to make on the private character of Mr. Mitchell, but as the agent of the monopolies who are now endeavoring to crush out the rights of the people, he is particularly obnoxious to every Democrat. In this respect he is not worse perhaps than any other Republican, as they are all tarred with the same stick. But what we wish to remark is that every Democratic member of the Legislature who votes for any Republican for U. S. Senator digs his political grave so deep that nothing but a special resurrection can save him.

THE recent Republican convention of Nevada nominated C. C. Powning of Washoe, for Congress. We notice that many Republican papers outside of that State are criticizing the nominee most heartlessly, and predict that our neighbors of "Sage-land" will return a Democrat to the next Congress. Having, from long residence in Nevada, a knowledge of the merits of the two opposing candidates, we are forced to conclude that the chances for the election of Mr. Cassidy, the Democratic candidate, are excellent. Indeed we cannot see how any man of sense, however much his opinions may be warped by party convictions, can wish for any other result. Powning is a young man devoid of the first qualification for the office and is only prominent by reason of superabundant cheek and presumption, while his opponent is a man of marked ability and one who has already made a national reputation in Congress.

Was it in Mitchell's back closet in Washington where J. M. Siglin first learned that his constituency wanted him to vote for John H. Mitchell? If not, when, where and under what circumstances did he make the discovery? Nine out of every ten Democrats who voted for his election, not only throw the vile calumny back in his teeth, but hold him up to public scorn as the traitor which his action in voting for Mitchell proves him to be. Judas betrayed his Lord for twenty pieces of silver. Siglin got—how much for betraying the Democrats who elected him to office. Let him go and do as did his illustrious prototype, whom he so closely imitated.

CORRECT.

The Democracy of Lane county met at Eugene City on last Monday, to express their opinion of John Long, a Democratic member of the Legislature who voted for Mitchell for Senator. The meeting was presided over by the old war-horse Hon. Robert B. Cochran. We give the last two resolutions:

Resolved, That we hereby arraign him for having betrayed the confidence reposed in him by the Democracy of this county, and

Resolved, That we hereby request the said John Long to resign his seat as a member of the said Legislative assembly.

This is a mild form of expressing the sentiments of every true Democrat in the State.

The postal department has issued blanks to the various postmasters to be used by them in informing letter writers or addressers that matter dropped in the mail has been insufficiently stamped. The effect of the new regulation is to make local postoffices perform part of the labor heretofore devolving on the dead letter office. Formerly an insufficiently stamped letter was sent direct to the dead letter office; now a card is sent to the address, informing him that a letter to him is held for postage, or if the name of the sender appears in print or otherwise on the envelope, a card is mailed to him, and on receipt of the postage the letter is sent to its destination. On this coast the regulation will save three weeks in the delivery of unstamped letters, and not one, unless he handles them, can imagine how many improperly stamped letters are mailed in the course of a week.
