From the Front. By the kindness of a gentleman recently from the front, we are enabled to give the following items:

End of track is now at camp eight, having been laid across Cow Creek on the 1st.

The railroad company are discharging men every day, and Chinamen's wages have been reduced to fifty cents a day.

In consequence of the reduction of forces, the hospital at camp eight has been discontinued and Dr. Flett has returned to Roseburg.

S. V. Stevens is now "Riding Boss" for all that portion of the road, about ten miles in all, which was formerly under Messrs Sweet, Carlyle and Mangum.

A slide, about four miles above Lewisville, obstructed transportation during all last week, but is now removed and trains run as usual.

Mr. Becker, time-keeper, and Mr. Edgar, chief steward, have resigned their respective positions and have gone to Portland.

The wagon road through the canyon is much improved, and teams make comparatively good time, thus greatly facilitating the work.

MAJOR VICTOR TREVITT, the Oregon pioneer and Mexican veteran, was buried on the 4th of March, on Memorial island, at his request.

The island lies in the Columbia river a short distance below the Dalles, and has been used by the Indians from time immemorial as a burial ground, hence its name which means "the island of the dead."

The funeral ceremonies were conducted by the Masonic fraternity and were very impressive. Nearly all the old residents who had lived in this section in pioneer days and known Major Trevitt in his younger days, were present to pay their last respects.

At half-past 12 the Hespero landed at a sandy spit on the lower end of this desolate spot. Above lay rocky bluffs covered with a few trees and a stunted undergrowth of sage brush.

The rude structures—the dead houses—appear at irregular intervals, which add a weird and ghastly aspect to this city of the silent majority.

The cortege was headed by the Masonic fraternity, and after climbing a rocky point came to the brow of the hill, where a brick vault had been prepared for the reception of the remains.

From this spot a beautiful view of the river and surrounding scenery could be had, and here the wintry blasts will from and the breezes of summer will smile around this man of infinite jest.

In time a marble slab fourteen feet high will mark the spot, thus being a signal to the passer-by of the last resting place of Major Trevitt.

KING KALAKAUA, or as he is familiarly known in San Francisco, King Calico, was formally crowned at Honolulu on February 12th.

Hon. Hyman Abraham, was in Roseburg on business during the week. His many friends were glad to take him by the hand again. It is reported from California that the C. P. railroad company will soon put 4000 men on the construction of the California end of the O. and C. railroad.

John Smith is Jackson county's latest addition to the list of inmates of the Oregon penitentiary. John had a weakness which led him to covet his neighbor's horse, hence his enforced residence at Salem. Pierre Petit, who had one foot frozen at the time Roseburg was frozen to death, had his foot amputated last Wednesday, by taking off about one-third of it.

Richmond Kelly, who read medicine with Drs. Reynolds and Hall, at Salem and has since been attending the Miami medical school at Cincinnati, has just been appointed resident physician of the Cincinnati hospital. This honor can only be obtained by six out of over six hundred medical students, after a critical examination.

F. P. Hogan has purchased what is known as the old Crane building, fronting on Main and Jackson streets in Roseburg, and is having it refitted as a store-room with a view of engaging in the mercantile business. We wish him success in his new undertaking. Governor Moody on March 1st appointed J. C. Church, of the firm of Robinson and Church, Eugene, county judge of Lane County. From what we can learn the appointment of Mr. Church is a fair selection.

Peter Humphrey and Co. have made arrangements to open a bank in Roseburg, which in a short time will be in full operation. William Humphrey of this place will be one of the incorporators. Born—in Looking Glass valley, Monday, March 5th, to the wife of W. D. Symons, a daughter. The little stranger has been well provided for, as our informant states it took its aunt about two hours and a quarter with the help of two lady assistants to arrange its clothing. Will, is the proudest man in all Looking Glass valley.

The school meeting for the Roseburg district was held at the academy on Monday March 5th. The attendance was small, as is usual when no tax is to be levied. Judge Fitzgough presided. The journal of the last meeting was read and approved as was the report of A. F. Campbell Esq., school clerk. The vote for director, in place of C. Gaddis whose term expired, resulted in the election of John Rast. A. F. Campbell was re-elected school clerk.

The Bradley corner, an old landmark, being the first store opened in Roseburg, was sold by A. R. Flint, Esq., to A. C. Marks, for \$2600. It is probable that the old shell will soon give place to a respectable building, as the lot is a valuable one, being 40 feet on Main street and running 100 feet to Jackson street.

Marshfield in Coos county, has been an unfortunate late. On Thursday, February 22, Peter Pons shot and killed Charles Strand in the Palace saloon. Pons had an examination before Justice Hyde and was discharged, on the ground of self-defense. On Sunday afternoon, February 25, William Phillips, superintendent of the Eastport mine, accidentally shot and killed Andrew Henrierson, in a shooting gallery. The parties were shooting at a target, when Phillips in loading his gun, accidentally discharged it, with the above result. Justice Hyde held Phillips in the sum of \$1000 to answer before the grand jury.

Dr. S. Joseph, superintendent of the insane asylum at East Portland, in his quarterly report to the secretary of state, gives the following statistics. Number of patients in the asylum Nov. 30, 1882, 322; number since admitted, 33; under treatment during the quarter, 355; patients died during quarter, 7; number of patients Feb. 28, 1883, 332. Cost of the state for care and treatment for the quarter ending Feb. 28, \$21,096.42.

The O. R. & N. Co. will bring seed wheat from San Francisco to Portland, to reseed the crop that has been killed by the cold weather in Oregon, for \$1 per ton, and the Oregon and California Railroad Company will transport it to any point on their line south of Portland for 75 cents per ton, the cost of transfer in Portland.

A horrible story comes from Jacksonville, says the Portland Telegram, which says that at about 1 o'clock last Sunday William Justus, one of the oldest settlers of that valley, was shot and killed instantly by his son, John Justus. The son's statement is that he was about putting away his rifle, after attempting to kill a chicken-lark, when it was discharged, the ball passing through his father's head. A coroner's jury was summoned Sunday afternoon, and were investigating all day. Various opinions are held concerning the affair, which, in the light of all the circumstances, looks very mysterious.

Well, our two old boys and two young girls were quick—too quick, for when the train emerged into daylight it was discovered that Mr. G. had his arms around the neck of Mr. S., with a portion of the long, white moustache of the latter tangled in his teeth, while the young ladies declared that Mr. G. spoiled all the fun by his egregious blunder.

Mining News. The following mining news we clip from the Jacksonville Times: Gin Lin seems to be the only miner in Uniontown precinct who has an abundance of water.

Many of the miners are busy, but some have no water at all. The mining season does not promise well. Goldworthy & Justus are opening the main led of Footh creek, which enterprise will no doubt prove remunerative in time.

Curtis Bros., who are engaged in pipping off the old tailings in Jackson creek, have been doing well, considering their opportunity. They took out about \$50 in one day last week.

The Gold Hill Mining Co. has employed Mr. Thomas, an experienced quartz miner, to prospect for the missing vein, which paid so enormously in days gone by. He has been engaged in repairing the old tunnel, which was in a dangerous condition.

Bybee, Hawke & Co. are running their claim near Waldo night and day, with good prospects. Snow fell to the depth of three feet at the head of the ditch and they will probably be able to run two pipes until the 1st of June, as they have excellent water privileges. A clean-up made after a few days' run yielded over \$300. Some of their ditch slid in, but the damage is about repaired.

Notes of a Trip to Coos County.

If you will grant me space in your columns I will give your readers a few of my observations while on a trip to Coos County.

Leaving Roseburg on February 20th, 1883, I traveled on the county road leading to Looking Glass, stopping the first night at the house of Jos. Jones, situated in Flournoy valley, where myself and horse were well cared for by the proprietor, who never fails to make one feel at home. I made an early start the following morning and wended my way up and down hills and through valleys until we reached the Coast range, which we ascend by a gentle grade to the summit of the same, where the division line runs dividing the counties of Douglas and Coos, then descending the mountain on the Coos side and following down the canyon, which is ten miles in length and covered heavily on both sides of the road with fine fir and pine timber, which at some future time will be valuable. This brings us to Brewster valley, which was first discovered and inhabited by W. H. Brewster, from whom it derived its name. This valley is about four miles in length by one mile wide and is well covered with myrtle trees of large size. The soil is of a sandy nature and very rich, producing vegetables and all garden produce abundantly. Strawberries also do well here when cultivated. I traveled on without noting anything of interest except the fine timber, until I came to Burton Prairie, the first prairie of any size after leaving Brewster valley. The land here is all taken by settlers, and produces well. Thos. Norris, formerly a resident of Douglas county, resides in this prairie. Traveling on I soon reached Simey, a small village situated on Kitchien Slough. It consists of a store, hotel, stable and several residences. Four miles further west brings us to Coos city, the terminus of the Coos Bay wagon road, where travelers take the steamboats for all points on the bay and sloughs. Coos city of late years has not improved, but these residing there hope for a good future. Before going further I must not forget to say that the Coos Bay wagon road, since it has been repaired under the direction of Wm. Glover, agent for Salsburg, Hainley & Co., is in a splendid condition for this time of year; a portion of this road having been closed for the past four years. A large sum of money has been expended under Mr. Glover's supervision in clearing and grading the road and in bridging the streams, the bridges all being made strong and substantial, the one across the north fork particularly being a fine piece of workmanship, a credit to the builder and the company for whom it was constructed. The company, so I am informed, contemplate making further improvements on the road this coming spring. The settlers along the road expect good times this summer from travel over the same. I arrived at Marshfield after a very pleasant trip, and after partaking of a hearty meal at the "The Blanco," took a look at the town, which has improved some since our last visit. It is well supplied with hotels, saloons and stores. The saw-mill of E. B. Dean is located here, which is running constantly filling orders for lumber for the San Francisco market.

Worth Thinking Of. The New York Times, a zealous Republican paper, expresses great indignation at a proposition made by the Coinage Committee of the House to have the surplus silver coin paid out among the people in redemption of interest-bearing obligations. It denounces this scheme as wicked, and indulges in considerable abuse of the Government could so manage its payments as to throw the silver dollars into use among the people, where they are needed. There is no mistake about this, and there is no mistake about the bitter determination of a class to drive and keep the silver out of use, to make room for the unclean small notes that were so long forced on the people as an ordinary currency. We do not like to find men fighting to defeat the legitimate working of a good law. All classes of silver-coin are needed among the interior population, and the Government, having taken upon itself the sole privilege of coining money, ought certainly to do what it can to place it where the people can use it. Once let the channels of interior circulation get well filled with silver, and small notes will not be able to compete, and thus certain parties will miss their expected profits.

Peach trees are in bloom in Roseburg. What place can beat that! The map of the new town of Julia on the extension of the O. & C. railroad, in the south part of this county, has been filed and recorded in the Clerk's office. There are nine cross streets, numbered from one to nine, and six avenues, viz: Pacific, Willis, Montgomery, Sol Abraham, Maurice and Albert.

A new copartnership has been formed in the legal business, between A. C. Jones and Wm. Willis, the firm of Willis and Mires having dissolved. Johnny Farquar and Frank Lehner have left for the front to work for the O. & C. railroad company.
