"MUCH ADO" Etc.—Justice Flint's court was occupied Tuesday and Wednesday of this week trying Frank Donaldson. Whilst we do not like to criticize public officers for doing what they believe to be their duty, we must say that the proceeding was of a character that should not have been allowed to come before the courts. The informant was a young "grass widow" of buxom appearance, who swore out an information charging a felony, the exact nature of which it is unnecessary to state. When the prisoner was arrested and brought before the court the charge was withdrawn and a complaint for an assault and battery preferred. A jury was called and the trial developed the fact that the prisoner, about ten o'clock at night, went to the house where the young woman was living, who was an intimate acquaintance, knocked and finding the door ajar, pushed it open and stepped into the house. The woman, who had retired, not knowing who he was, arose and with language more forcible than select ordered him out, and he stood not on the order of his going but went at once. One of the neighbors hearing the conversation put in an appearance, hence the necessity for arrest. It is needless to say the verdict of the jury was "not guilty," and the Justice and District Attorney earned their fees and the young woman a free advertisement at the county's expense.

LOCAL ITEMS.

Joseph Nimchick, who shot and killed Thomas Ray on the Santiam, mistaking him, as he claimed, for a deer, was convicted of manslaughter in the district court of Linn county and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary.

The editor of the Salem Town Talk is interesting himself in regard to the successor of Judge M. P. Deady. He need give himself no uneasiness on this subject. Judge Deady will have no successor until he dies or is promoted.

The Watchman says the fruit in the Walla Walla valley is all killed. The warm weather previous to the first week in February started the sap and swelled the buds, hence when the cold snap came it destroyed everything except the apple trees, and they will not bear this year.

Justice Huffer held an examination of John Justus, says the Times, charged with murder, last Saturday, March 7th, and committed him to jail without bail. The case will come up in the Circuit Court at the June term.

Near Creswell, on the 13th of March, says the Eugene Guard, Mrs. Wm. Miller, while leaning over the fire preparing food for the table, her dress caught fire, and before assistance could be had she was burned to death. The lady was alone in the house at the time. She leaves a husband and a large family of small children, on whom her death will fall with terrible weight.

On account of the increase of business the O. R. and N. Co. intend to increase the number of trips between Portland and San Francisco. After April first a steamer will leave San Francisco and Portland every three days. The increase in the number of trips is independent of the regular sailing days of steamers carrying combustibles.

The Right Rev. Bishop of Iowa, I. P. I., says the Sentinel, paid recently an unexpected visit to his aged brother. It is indeed wonderful to see these two pioneers of the faith reach so advanced an age and keep their health and strength. Bishop Blanchet is younger by two years than his brother the Archbishop. The latter was born in September, 1796, which will soon make him 88 year old. May both venerable prelates be spared yet a long time to see the trees they have planted and watered with the sweat of their labor, bear much and plentiful fruit.

William Dye, the young man who some time since hired a horse at Carlton's livery stable to go to Burnett's place in Round prairie, some ten miles south of Roseburg, and failed to return it and was a short time ago arrested with the horse in his possession, in Grant county, by a Deputy Sheriff of Lake. He was, on Monday, brought to Roseburg by Sheriff Purdon. He had his examination before Judge Fitzgugh, charged with the larceny of the horse, on Thursday, who committed him to await the action of the grand jury and fixed his bail at \$300.

The paymaster of the O. and C. railroad left Roseburg on the 15th inst. and paid off the hands on the southern extension. From Wm. Pitchford, who accompanied him, we learn that all the tunnels are completed as far south as No. 7, which is expected to be finished in about one month. No. 8, the big tunnel, is progressing well and will be through, it is expected, by September next. A large force is being sent into Wolf creek valley beyond No. 8 to grade the road to the Gravel creek tunnel. The work in Cow creek valley has been very expensive and the progress has not been as rapid as was anticipated.

From a late copy of the Los Angeles Herald it appears that the concrete water pipe has come into general use in Southern California. It is now, after careful test, being used for the sewers of Los Angeles, as the best material that can be obtained. For sub-irrigation it is a perfect success, while its use for domestic water pipes, being free from rust, is considered the best that can be found. The test and success are complete, and are certified by the City Engineer of Los Angeles and many prominent agriculturists and wine growers. That section, one of whom (Chaffey Bros.) has twenty miles in use and will lay twenty more this year. The farmers and gardeners of Douglas county would greatly increase their crops if they would use this cheap and permanent method of irrigating, which can be procured in this city of L. Belfels and Co.

In the U. S. Circuit Court on last Monday, Judge Deady granted provisional injunctions in the cases of Wells, Fargo & Co. against the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, and the same against the Oregon and California road. The court held that Wells, Fargo & Co. were duly incorporated and that its name was legally changed from the Holiday Overland Mail and Express Company to Wells, Fargo & Co.; that the express business was a recognized branch of the carrying trade of the country; that railway corporations were bound to treat it accordingly; that a railway corporation was created by the State of Oregon to serve the public as a common carrier for reasonable compensation, and must adapt itself in the discharge of its duties to the public; that the Oregon corporation act, which declares that railway corporations shall be common carriers and have authority to take such tolls for transportation of freight and passengers as they may prescribe, only authorizes the taking of reasonable tolls, and is a contract with the State to that effect, but no more, and what is such reasonable compensation is a question for the court to determine in each case. In allowing the injunctions the court directed that plaintiffs should pay the defendants pending the suit, the same compensation for express facilities as it had paid heretofore, the court assuming this such pay was reasonable.

COLE'S VALLEY.

Professor Thomas closed his six-months term of school on the 15th inst., with a fine exhibition by the school children. The evening's entertainment commenced by the Professor introducing W. B. Clark, who in his usual eloquent manner entertained the audience with some well-timed remarks, among which he assured them that he was not employed to make them a speech, but simply to perform the ornamental part, in which he succeeded admirably. After this we were entertained with some fine music by the Cleveland brass band. Then followed the reading of the Band of Hope, by Kittie Emmett, which was well rendered. Next on the programme was the reading of the paper entitled the "Young Eagle," by Miss Della Thomson. The reading was done finely, showing good culture. The verdict was that the entertainment was a grand success, and reflected great credit upon Professor Thomas, the teacher, who will take charge of the Calapooia school in a short time.
