Charles Hodge of Portland, the leading member of the firm of Hodge, Davis & Co., died at his residence of pneumonia and was buried on last Sunday, by the Masonic fraternity. He was born in 1828, and came to California in 1849 and removed to Portland in 1860. He leaves a wife and one child. He was chairman of the board of trustees of the Unitarian church, President of the board of school directors, treasurer of Willamette Lodge No. 2, Free and Accepted Masons, and an active and valuable member of the board of trade. He was highly respected by the business community of Portland and his loss is universally lamented.

The value of the fruit crop is very much underrated, especially in Southern Oregon. As a proof of its importance we copy a letter of Wallis Nash of Corvallis. He says: "I sent a sample box of dried apples to New York last December. They were submitted to three leading houses in the trade there, and priced at 10 cents per pound at that time. I also sent a bottle of dried plums, similar to one I have just sent you by express, and they were pronounced equal to the best foreign fruit in the market. Similar fruit is sold extensively in London for dessert purposes at retail prices varying from 45 to 60 cents a pound."
