## COOS BAY!

Daily Oregenian May 30. Several days ago we had information that an important transfer of real estate and other property at Coos Bay had been made, the supposition being that this transaction was the beginning of great operations of development. A dispatch published this morning confirms these suppositions and furnishes an outline of the plans of the purchaser, who is the representative of eastern capital. It is proposed to build a rail road connecting Coos Bay with the Oregen and California line, at Roseburg, and to use this as a basis for the development of great resources which, in the rough, have been secured by the eastern men. New ccal mines are to be opened and the capacity of others increased, new mills are to be built and old ones enlarged, and a new line of steamers put on, connecting Coos Bay with San Francisco, In short, the industrial conditions of the whole

Coos bay region are to be revolution-

A consequence of the connecting line of road between the bay and the O. & C. line will be to make the southwest coast country practically a part of Oregon. Heretofore its only connection with this State has been judicial. Its business and social relations have been almost wholly with California. And to California the connection has been highly profitable. The six or sev en large mills en Coos bay have produced many millions of feet of lumber each year, all of which has gone to the San Francisco market, the product of a large barrel factory has gone there, and all of its agricultural and other products have gone south. And, too, San Francisco has enjoyed the whole general trade of the bay, which has amounted to more than a million dollars a year. Construction of the proposed railroad will give the people of the bay the choice of two markets, wit advantage of quicker communication with that of their own State. Competition of Oregen on one hand and California on the other will naturally result in better prices for their products than they have heretofore received,

There is not in the whole of Oregon a county richer in resources than Coos, while it enjoys a variety not equaled by any other, unless, perhaps, it is its undeveloped neighbor on the north Columbia. It has mountains of coal, great areas of timber, including some fine furniture woods, which grow nowhere else, fine stock and dairy ranges py, miserable women which would ma- and am happy to state that one bottle and much fine farming land. Even its isolation has not wholly prevented de velopment of these resources, though little more than a beginning has been made. But population will pour in under the new conditions and Coos will soon take rank with the rich counties of the State.

The development of Coos county, certain and immediate result of the proposed railroad, will furnish new ar guments for the Coos bay and Coquille river improvements now in hand by the Government. The chief objection urged against these public works is that the population to be benefitted is small and that the commerce of these places is trifling. Both will grow fast enough with the opportunities which quick rail connection will afford, And lying south of the Coquille river there is a region which will become tributary to the new road. There is no finer sheep range in the country than that of Curry county and just as soon as means of shipment are a little easier its wool product will be enormous.

Roseburg, which has just suffered a blight in the loss of a great share of its Southern Oregon trade, due to the onward movement of the Oregon and California railroad, will, upon completion of the Coos bay read again enjoy the advantages of a terminus, and if its merchants are enterprising they will make it an important center of supply. There is certain to be a contest between Portland and San Francisco for the Coos Bay trade. We shall have the advantage of quicker and shorter communication by rail, while the conditions of ocean traffic are about equal between the two cities. Relations of acquaintance and credit will be in favor of San Francisco, but these advantages are not invincible and we shall be surprised if Portland dees not gain a good share of the bay trade.

The special disadvantage which Coos bay has labored under is non-resident ownership of her great industries. All the mills are owned in San Francisco. and all but one of the coal mines. All tha profits of these industries have, of course, gone out of the country. This is an evil net soon or easily corrected. but the development of agriculture and general business will slowly and certainly work a revolution.


