

Heartless Frauds.

The crash of the Freedman's Savings Bank, Washington, D. C., is attended with sadder consequences than usually come from the collapse of these often soulless corporations. Not that all the trust funds deposited were swallowed, but because the majority of the depositors were needy, ignorant colored people. By a fortuitous rise in some of the bank's real estate it was enabled, notwithstanding its stealings which appear in recent fortunes for its managers, to pay 38 cents on the dollar. The bold stage robber is a prince in comparison with such cruel and cowardly rogues. Among the many radical reforms indispensable in the "best Government the sun ever shone on" is some scheme by which savings banks may be made honest institutions. In some of the States of the Union arson is punishable by death. The law is wholesome, for a scoundrel who sets fire to a house is a diabolical, cold-blooded villain, who for plunder or spite destroys property or endangers life. The fraudulent bank man is guilty of the same crime only on a larger scale; besides the loss and distress of others all go to add to his lucre and increase the comforts of his luxurious living.

If the men who wrecked the Freedman's Bank could have seen the poor, needy people, whose little earnings they had pilfered, wandering about the burst depository until worn out and discouraged, day after day, for two weeks, patiently waiting to get what had been left for them out of the robbery, they would have been moved by the spectacle if their hearts are not of flint. Few of the poor colored people received more than \$10 or \$12 and many got a balance of only a few cents.

"I had \$70," said an old aunty, "and I expected that it was safer in the bank than for me to keep it. I had saved that by a few pennies at a time from a good while before the war. Thank the Lord, I say, that I can get so much of it back again."

"Boss," said an aged colored man. "I know'd I'd have the rheumatism when I got old, and I saved \$300. When the bank was begun I know'd some of the gemmen so well that I put it all in. But the old man won't get but plagu'y little more'n half of it out again."

A Third Party.

In such a contingency the vote is taken by States, the majority of a delegation controlling the State.
