Political Speculation.

It is getting to be a matter of some interest to politicians, says the S. F. Examiner, to speculate upon party chances in the leading States. Naturally opinion takes its coloring from personal partiality. The Republicans never give up hope, and the same sentiment springs eternal in the Democratic breast. But, notwithstanding their minor prejudices, there is a wide field for political speculation. New York, as heretofore is regarded as the pivotal State. As it goes so goes the country. Yet the condition of parties in the Empire State is anything but favorable to reliable calculations. The Republicans are divided, certainly, but it is not safe to count on a continuance of their disagreement through a national canvass. Indeed, it is asserted that all they will lose by internal factions will be more than compensated for by the opposition of Tammany to the County Democracy. But this is so evidently a pretense in fact and an expedient in purpose that even well informed Republicans treat it with derision. The Democratic party of New York, and, indeed, of all the leading States, as here in California, was never in better trim for a national canvass. It is everywhere arrayed against a high protective tariff and the aggressive spirit of monopoly which Republican ascendancy has fostered and encouraged. These issues in themselves are ample reasons for Democratic triumph. They not only consolidate Democratic strength but bring to its aid the Republican sentiment of the country. Indeed, the President has stated that the only chance the Republicans have in the next election is in a divided South. With this end in view he has projected his famous "Southern movement," which, under the leadership of men like Chalmers and Mahone, and with the aid of the colored vote, it is hoped will Republicanize the leading Southern States. This is a practical concession of New York to the Democrats. Equally evident is the fact that California and Oregon will be found in the Democratic column. Their allegiance to the Republican party has lapsed forever. They have passed out of the shadow of the influence which, here as elsewhere, has utilized Republican ascendancy to strengthen corporation power and render the people and industries of the country the subservient instruments of organized capital. The Democratic party has broken this bondage and obtained an ascendancy which it will be sure to preserve.

Dorsey's Disclosures.

The New York Sun has published a history of the Garfield campaign and administration, occupying several columns in small type. In this history Garfield is shown in a very unenviable light. His peridy and double-dealing are written up in their true colors. His bargain with Jay Gould for money to carry Ohio and Indiana which included on Garfield's part the appointment of Stanley Matthews to the Supreme Court, his ingratitude to Dorsey and Brady, his deliberate falsehoods to Conkling, his bargain with the New York brokers, by which they were to get the job of refunding the public debt. Since the publication of the above disclosure by Secretary Dorsey, the Republican papers, and especially the Oregonian, have assiduously labored through their editorial columns to contradict the statement of the man who of all others, from the position he occupied as Secretary of the Republican National Committee, knows whereof he speaks.

First, the Oregonian claims to have a private telegram in which Dorsey denies that he made the disclosure. Second, that he ought not to be believed, because he knows more about the Star route robberies than he knows about Garfield's complicity in the scheme of corruption to secure his election. The Oregonian has General Swain to say: "While Garfield appreciated Dorsey's services as a politician he had said to him (Swain) that Dorsey had a screw loose in his moral make-up, and therefore it was impossible that Garfield should have had any confidential relations with him."

The fact, however, remains as a matter of history. That as the outcome of the Chicago convention of 1880, Garfield was nominated, and at his earnest request Stephen W. Dorsey, the Star route thief whom the Republican party dare not convict, was made Secretary of the National Republican Committee, and really its chairman. Stanley Matthews was appointed on the Supreme Bench by Garfield, and it was publicly charged at the time, at the dictation of Jay Gould. He has at all times decided in favor of monopolies and against the rights of the people regardless of law or justice.

The editor of the Oregonian must in-

deed have a bad memory to forget that campaign of 1880. He quoted Dorsey more frequently as political authority, than he ever did the Bible or religion. We are not among those who would blacken the memory of the dead, but are willing that the grave should cover a multitude of sin. We are willing to believe Dorsey as corrupt as his own statement, or that of the Oregonian makes him out to be. Still the fact remains as a matter of history that he was the trusted Secretary and manager of the campaign that elected Garfield.

The Crops.

The cutting is nearly over and threshing has begun in this county. After a careful consultation with farmers from all the different sections we are able to state that the result of the harvest will be above the average. The oat crop is tight in some places and much over the average in others. The barley crop is heavier than usual everywhere and the wheat crop gives a better yield than last year, even the late sown grain, which was expected to amount to but little, is turning out better than was expected. Many farmers cut considerable of their grain for hay, with the expectation that the crop would be short, but the timothy proved to be nearly up to the average and will give them a small surplus. From Portland papers we learn that the Willamette valley is yielding much better than there was any reason for expecting, and while the crop will not be a full one, the surplus for export will very closely approach the figures of other years. The yield east of the mountains will be enormous, the export surplus of that section being estimated at 180,000 tons, nearly double of last year. Prices are not yet settled. Oats are quoted at 65 cents in Portland, barley and wheat are not yet quoted there, but they are both reported firm in San Francisco while freights are quiet. From the present outlook it seems as if our farmers would receive a good price for their grain, if the rail road company does not take more than half of it for freight.

The news has been received that the dread scourge cholera has made its appearance in Egypt, and by the latest advices we are informed that the death in Cairo and the adjacent vicinity amounted to more than 1,000 daily. The strict quarantine which has been kept around Alexandria has not prevented it from attacking that city and even the British army stationed there. The East has always been the originator of this dread plague, from whence it has spread to Europe and thence to this country at least twice during the memory of the present generation. With the increase of traffic it is not to be expected that the United States will escape the plague entirely. The force of the blow may be broken by the advance of medical science and the increased facility of carrying out preventive measures. There is another fearful plague that threatens us, but more especially the Southern States. The yellow fever has broken out at Vera Cruz and Havana, and should it again obtain a foothold on the lower Mississippi at time, that section of the country would be depopulated. We hope that the early measures taken to prevent the introduction of these plagues into our country may be successful, but it is of the utmost importance that every city, town and village should take immediate steps to remove from their limits every cause of pestilence.

The effect of the new tariff law, which went into operation on the 1st of the month, is being watched with a great deal of interest. Even its framers believe now that it will turn out to be a combination of jobs.
