

Republican "Harmony."

It is wonderful how soon oblivion covers the memory of the dead; with what alacrity place hunters desert the cause of a fallen statesman, when the dark pall has shut him out from the busy walks of life and he is no longer powerful to minister to their wants or expectations.

Should Arthur be renominated, as present appearances indicate, the "half breeds" would be asked to forget all about his being turned out of the New York custom house by Hayes in order that the office might be honestly administered; they would be expected to shut their eyes to the painful truth that he vetoed the Chinese restriction bill; that he set his seal of condemnation upon certain of our improvements and deflected our appropriations for the improvement of the rivers and harbors of the Pacific coast.

So dexterously has the party lash been applied that even here on this coast the Oregonian, a paper that made some pretensions to respectability, is forced to eschew its opposition to stalwart bossism and swallows the old ring, with all its corruption and nastiness, where only a few short months ago it detected blood stains on the President's robes and publicly declaimed through its columns that the opposition of Conkling, Arthur & Co. to Garfield's administration was the primary cause of his assassination.

The stalwarts having received such a setback in 1880, will not permit of a repetition in 1884, and so thoroughly are they executing the work they have in hand, that it will be impossible for any considerable opposition to the ring to get seats in the convention of 1884. There will be no dark horse this time.

In Virginia there is a strong secession of Republicans from the readjuster or Mahone party. The secession is led by a politician of some local celebrity named Decendorf, formerly a member of Congress. It threatens the ascendancy of the Mahone party in the state, since it will take away from that organization all the influence commanded by the Republican statesmen who have been pushed into the background by the Mahone movement or ignored in distributing the spoils. The "regular" Democracy are much elated by the quarrel and division of their opponents.

A CORRESPONDENT, N. H., telegram to the Oregonian of the 21st inst. says: The forty-second ballot resulted in the election of Austin F. Pike for United States Senator for six years, from March 4, 1883. The result of the ballot was greeted with tumultuous applause. Pike is 63 years old, a lawyer in active practice, has been a representative in Congress, and is considered one of the ablest Republicans in the State.

If the protectionists expect to retain their hands in the pockets of the people, they will have to abolish the study of political economy in our schools and colleges. Learning upon this subject is dangerous to their enterprises.

Civil Service.

There appears to be a great deal said at the present time about civil service reform and quite a number of the States which have lately held conventions, especially Republicans, have a plank declaring that they are in favor of civil service reform. Exactly what is intended by these resolutions is not made apparent by any of the declarations. About all that can be gathered from them is that great abuses have crept into the administration of the civil affairs of the government and that these abuses need reforming.

That twenty years of a licensed system of plunder and spoliation should develop these abuses is not to be wondered at, but to find the party that has fattened and grown rich from these speculations and crimes declaring against them surpasseth understanding, and when couched in so general terms as to be meaningless must be taken with suspicion and many grains of allowance.

If they mean by civil service reform, as is claimed by some of their leading newspapers, that there should be a perpetuation in office or life tenure of the appointees of the government, then we earnestly protest against such a policy, for it is by long continuation in place that the largest frauds and greatest peculations have occurred. By such a policy the chances for fraud and speculation are increased.

It is by frequent changes in the administration of the affairs of government, that the safety and perpetuity of our institutions lay. It is by frequent rotation in office that the people become familiar with the affairs of government, and the greater number of our citizens are instructed in the public service. With the people as with an individual who understands the routine of business, the chances of being robbed by servants and employes are greatly diminished. Where the people are educated and familiar with the affairs of their own government it is their own fault if they suffer abuses of the public service long to continue.

But where they are uninstructed and know nothing of the forms and methods by which the public service is conducted, the means of detecting abuses are cut off and they are powerless to remedy any evil which may exist. The policy of long tenure for the appointees of the government is a snare and a delusion and intended for fraud and speculation.

MINNESOTA DEMOCRATS—St. Paul advices, August second, say: The Democratic State convention assembled at noon to-day, C. F. Buck was made temporary chairman. After appointing the usual committees, and a recess had been taken, Chairman W. W. McNair was nominated for Governor, Biermann being the only other candidate, on the first ballot. The only contest worthy of mention was for the governorship and lieutenant governorship, R. L. Frasse was nominated for the latter on first ballot. Secretary of State, J. J. Green; State Treasurer, John Ludwig; Attorney General, J. W. Willis; Railway Commissioner, P. Lenholens. Anti-prohibition resolutions were passed. The platform declares for a tariff for a revenue only, approves the river and harbor bills, and calls for a revision of the patent laws.

In the grand effort to get up an Arthur boom about all his admirers have to say in his favor is in reference to his size and shape. He has a great deal of both. They have a large subject to expand upon.

SUICIDE OF A KING'S SON.—A finely educated young Swede was found dead in the Swedish Lutheran church at Englewood, near this city yesterday, having committed suicide. The morning papers claim that the young man has been identified as an illegitimate son of King Oscar of Sweden, and that he was raised in the family of a sister of the King. During his stay in this country he has been engaged as an instructor in a private school.—Chicago dispatch, 2d inst.
