LOCAL ITEMS.

Mrs. Stephen Minard returned last
Saturday from a visit to her daughter,
Mrs. Black, in British Columbia.

Ex-Senator Sharon of Nevada, was
arrested in San Francisco on the 8th
inst., upon the charge of adultery, pre-
ferred by a Miss Hall, who claims a
contract of marriage.

Henry Singleton hauled from his fa-
ther's place on Deer creek to S. Abra-
ham's in Roseburg, with two horses, a
load of hay weighing 3051 pounds,
which is the boss load of the season.

Captain Basse, of New Bedford, Mas-
sachusetts, President of the Oregon Im-
provement and Transportation Com-
pany, is in the city. He leaves to-day,
in company with Ex-governor Clad-
wick and B. Hermann, for Coos bay.

Hon. I. G. Lund, assistant superin-
tendent of the railway mail service, in-
terviewed the p.stoffice at this place
officially last Saturday. Hereafter all
eastern mails go by way of the North-
ern Pacific, saving over one day's time
in transmission.

Rev. J. H. Inrich left last Monday
for Portland, accompanied by Master
Arthur Lane, son of Hon. L. F. Lane,
and Master Lewis, from the Coquille,
who are on their way to school at Mon-
treal, Canada, whither they will proceed
under the charge of Archbishop Seg-
hers.

Baily Singleton on Wednesday of
last week, while threshing at his brother's
in attempting to adjust the wind on
the cleaner, slipped and had the mis-
fortune to have his hand caught be-
tween a belt and pulley, which disloca-
ted and mashed the flesh off his thumb
and broke the three large bones of his
left hand. The wound is very painful
but will not prove a permanent injury.
Mr. Singleton has run threshing ma-
chines for sixteen years and this is the
first hurt he has received.

sonville. Curry, Jackson, Josephine,
Klamath and Lake counties.

Fourth division—J. R. Hayden,
Olympia, formerly collector of Wash-
ington. Washington territory lying
west of the Cascade mountains.

COUNTY COURT.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 5.

In the matter of the location of a county
road from the town of Yoncalla to Scotts
valley. The viewers having failed to file
their report the petition is dismissed.

In the matter of the location of a county
road from a point 3-1-3 chains west of the
north-east corner of section 30, township 22,
south range 7 west, to the northwest corner
of Elkton flouring mill, in the town of Elk-
ton. The viewers having made favorable
report and it appearing to the court that the
petitioners do not want said road, it is or-
dered that the report be laid over until the
January term of court.

In the matter of the change of the bound-
ary of road districts number 4, 5 and 6, it is
ordered that a change be made in said
road district, commencing at the northeast
corner of section 4, township 22, south, range
5 west; thence south along said line one-half
mile, thence south to the county road leading
from the town of Drain north, thence north-
east to half-mile line running north through
the center of section 33, township 21 south,
range 5 west, thence north on said line to
the north boundary of road district number
five.

In the matter of the change in county
road leading from Long's in Yoncalla, to
Ward's in Pass creek, William Wise, W. A.
Plesley and Albert Sherrill appointed view-
ers, and John Littell surveyor, to meet at
Yoncalla, Sept. 22, 1883.

In the matter of change in the Coles val-
ley road, Robert Woodruff, John Wright
and R. Ward appointed appraisers and A.
R. Flint surveyor, to meet on September 24,
1883, at the house of W. C. Coppions.

Miss Katie Buick was appointed to a schol-
arship in the State University.

In the matter of the location of a county
road from Yoncalla to Scotts valley, ordered
that D. W. Stearns, Presley Eubanks and
John Goff be appointed viewers and William
Thiel surveyor, to meet at Yoncalla Sep-
tember 20, 1883, after qualifying to view,
locate and survey said road, as prayed for in
the petition, and make due return to the
next term of court.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 6.
Ordered that a license issue to W. H.
Blackwood to sell spirituous liquors in less
quantities than one quart, in Canyonville
precinct, for the term of one year.

Ordered that a license issue to E. C. Dry
to sell spirituous liquors in less quantities
than one quart, in Myrtle creek precinct,
for the term of one year.

Ordered that a license issue to Leonard
Stinger to sell spirituous liquors in less
quantities than one quart, in Canyonville
precinct, for one year.

Ordered that a license issue to John G.
Borchard to sell spirituous liquors in less
quantities than one quart, in Gardiner pre-
cinct, for six months.

Ordered that a license issue to T. C.
Gault to sell spirituous liquors in less quan-
tities than one quart, in Canyonville pre-
cinct, for six months; also a license for the
term of one year.

In the matter of keeping the county poor-
house, ordered that the County Judge advertise
for sealed bids for keeping the poor for two
years, the bids to be opened at January term
of court, 1884.

In the matter of the location of a county
road beginning 21.18 chains east of the north-
east corner of W. H. Wilson's donation
land claim, on the county road leading from
Ward's on Pass creek, to John Long's, run-
ning thence west to the intersection of the
Pass creek road. The viewers having made
favorable report it is ordered that the report
be accepted and the proceedings recorded;
that said road be declared a public highway
and the supervisor of the district ordered to
open the same.

In the matter of the location of a county
road from the north-east corner of the
north-west quarter of section 6, in township
20 south, range 8 west, to a stake in the
center of the Canas valley and Roseburg
road. William Irwin, K. B. Ireland, and
James Davlin appointed viewers and A. R.
Flint surveyor, to meet at J. A. Kirkendall's
house, in Canas valley, on October 10, 1883,
after qualifying to view, locate and survey
said road, as prayed for in the peti-
tion, and make return at the next regular
term of court.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 7.
In the matter of the location of a county
road from Julia to Redfield's. The viewers
having filed a favorable report it is ordered
that the same be approved and the proceed-
ings recorded; that said road be declared a
public highway and that the supervisor
open the same.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 8.
In the matter of the levy of taxes for the
year 1883. The assessment roll having been
returned by the assessor, James A. Sterling,
to the board of equalization and by the board
equalized as by law required, and the said
roll appearing correct, it is accepted and ap-
proved, and it appearing by said assessment
roll that there is property, real and per-
sonal, embraced in said roll subject to taxa-
tion in the sum of \$3,087,564, it is therefore
ordered that the levy be made as follows, to wit:

For school tax four mills.
For State tax four mills.
For Insane tax four mills.
For military tax 5-10 of a mill.
For university tax 1-10 of a mill.
For county tax 10-4-10 mills.

Of all the property in the county, making
20 mills in all, and the County Clerk is di-
rected to make out the tax list accordingly.
In the matter of the construction of a
county bridge over the south Umpqua river
at Roseburg. It is ordered that Dr. S.
Hamilton, A. J. Bellows and John Rast be
appointed to select a suitable site for said
bridge and that said committee report at the
January term of court, 1884.

There was audited during the session
claims to the amount of 13,558 77, for which
warrants were ordered drawn.

Accidentally Shot.

Lincoln Murphy, whose parents re-
side near Dillard, while out hunting in
the mountains between the headwaters
of Olalla and Cow creek, was accident-
ally shot by his brother, a lad of four-
teen or fifteen years of age.

A party consisting of W. W. Wal-
ker, Wm. McBoe sr. and the Murphy
boys were out hunting near the scene
of the accident. The younger of the
boys wounded a deer a short distance
from their camp early Sunday morn-
ing, and came to the camp and wanted
some of the party to go out and help
him get it. None of them volunteer-
ing to go he started to go by himself,
when his brother started in a different
direction. A short time afterwards Mr.
Walker and McBoe heard the report of
a gun and went in the direction of the
report. They had not gone far when
they heard the younger of the boys
crying that he had shot his brother.
They went to the scene and found that
the deceased had been shot in the back
of the head and instantly killed.

Deceased was eighteen or twenty
years of age.

The party brought the remains to
David Thompson's on Monday, and they
were buried in the cemetery near
Dillard on Tuesday. The probabilities
are that the brother mistook deceased
for a deer, and the sad event adds an-
other victim to the careless use of fire-
arms by thoughtless boys.

Assessment Roll.

James A. Sterling has completed the as-
sessment for Douglas county. There is on
the roll 504,000 acres, valued at \$1,867,152;
1233 town lots, \$250,375; improvements,
\$416,930; merchandise, \$877,595; money,
notes and accounts, \$1,124,495; household
furniture, \$120,020; 4211 horses and mules,
\$162,370; 5428 cattle, \$131,095; 119,753
sheep, \$180,743; 11,467 hogs, \$26,215.
Total valuation, \$4,656,957; indebtedness,
\$1,292,743; exemptions, \$276,650.
Taxable property, \$3,087,564; polls col-
lected, 610; polls not collected, 932.
There are 12 dogs in the county valued at
\$600.

In assessing mortgages the assessor has
endeavored to prevent any double taxation.
