The Cholera! This dread scourge, whose home is in India and Arabia, is again pursuing its periodical course eastward and westward around the world.

In these countries the climate, density of population and the filthy habits of the people renders it almost impossible to check the plague until it has run its course.

With the immense commerce which Europe and the United States now carry on with all nations it is hardly possible that these countries will escape. The near approach of cold weather, which prevents the spread of the disease, is likely to secure immunity during the present year, but experience teaches that it will make its appearance the next.

Scientists are not agreed as to mode by which the seeds of the disease are disseminated, but all agree that a healthy diet, pure water, and an abstinence of all stimulants are almost sure preventives. It is therefore of the first importance that steps be early taken to secure the utmost cleanliness during the coming season, especially in towns and cities where it is now universally neglected.

How this is to be enforced in the crowded Chinese quarters of our cities will be a difficult problem, but it must be solved to secure the safety of the white people on this coast.
