Adventurers in Council.

Boss Mahone, Fort Pillow Chalmers United States Marshal Longstreet, Col lectors of Internal Revenue Brady and Craig of Virginia, Congressman Jeffords, Editor Gorham, Duellist Cash, says the New York Sun, and other repudiators and officeholders and office seekers, have been holding a conference at Washington to organize "a movement" in the South.

These hungry patriots are loud in their professions of devotion to President Arthur. They are all Arthur men, and propose to support him as the Republican candidate for President in 1884, if he will, meantime, support them. They believe in the efficacy of patronage generously bestowed.

Outside of Virginia these adventurers cannot muster a corporal's guard. They represent public sentiment just as the three tailors of Tooley street did when they assumed to speak for the people of England. Fort Pillow Chalmers tried to organize an "independ" ent" convention in Mississippi, and failed ridiculously.

The Republican party has come to sad pass when these substitutes for the carpet-baggers assume to lead it, either as Straightouts or as purchased allies, christened by Mahone "Coalitionisus." Yet they are recognized by the administration, and encouraged to send delegates to the national convention by apparent friends of the President,

How Mahone and the mongrel crew which he leads will be received by the regular Republicans in convention, remains to be seen. Their admission would certainly be a signal for the open opposition of thousands who have hitherto made sacrifices for the party, and who have stood by it under the most provoking circumstances. A solid South composed of these venal elements might control the nomination and dictate a candidate objectionable to the rank and file of the party. A result of that kind, in presence of the existing disaffection, would aggravate the present troubles, and lead to a bolt.

The organized Republican machine which is controlled by only a few of the voters, is kept up entirely by the cohesion of public plunder. All these coalitions and alliances and bargains are made by the managers, with a view of covering defections caused by the discontent and the disgust of honest Republicans who are unwilling to countenance repudiation or to accept Boss Mahone as a leader.

Having stolen the Presidency in 1876, and having carried the election of 1880 by barefaced corruption and fraud, the managers are now preparing to play a new game for 1884. But the exposures recently made and the experience of their adversaries in the last two campaigns, are obstacles in the way of success not easily removed The men who contributed millians two years ago will hardly venture to repeat that experiment, in view of what has been disclosed to the country, and the coalition cannot survive without plenty of money.

This dread sccurge, whose home is in India and Arabia, is again pursuing its periodical course eastward and westward around the world. In these countries the climate, density of population and the filthy habits of the people renders it almost impossible to check the plague until it has run its course. With the immense commerce which Europe and the United States now carry on with all nations it is hardly possible that these countries will escape. The near approach of cold weather, which prevents the spread of the disease, is likely to secure immunity during the present year, but experience teaches that it will make its appearance the next. Scientists are not agreed as to mode by which the seeds of the disease are disseminated, but all agree that a healthy diet, pure water, and an abstinence of all stimulants are almost sure preventives. It is there. fore of the first importance that steps be early taken to secure the utmost cleanliness during the coming season, especially in towns and cities where it is now universally neglected.
