THE DEMOCRATS

Carry Ohio and Make Large Gains in Iowa.

From the latest information it is safe to say Hoadley, the Democratic candidate, is elected Governor of Ohio, by from five to ten thousand majority, together with the entire State ticket. The Legislature will be Democratic.

In Iowa the Democrats have made large gains. The Republican candidate for Governor is elected by from twelve to fifteen thousand plurality.

The prohibitory amendment is defeated in both States.

In Ohio the Republicans attribute their defeat to the wool tariff and the prohibitory amendment. The prohibitory amendment received a large vote, although neither party represented the cause of temperance, and was only defeated by the vote in Cincinnati and Hamilton county, which gave a large majority against it.

The wool question, no doubt, had a great deal to do with the result, although the Republican speakers by the most artful jugglery, attempted to shift the responsibility of its reduction.

The Wool Question.

The State of Oregon and Douglas county especially, is largely devoted to wool-growing and sheep husbandry. The wool industry has furnished a larger revenue to our people than any other. The export of sheep and wool during the last five years has brought more money into Douglas county than from any other source, and has furnished our farmers with a larger profit than all other products combined.

The unwarranted action of the last Republican Congress in reducing the tariff on wool and increasing the tariff on manufactured woolen goods, has robbed our farmers of five cents profit on every pound of wool sold in the county, and thirty cents on every dollar's worth of flannels or woolen hosiery or underwear bought for use in their families.

The law was passed by a party vote, for the benefit of the New England manufacturers, whom the prospective profits enabled to buy up the party bosses who manipulated and run the Republican machine, both in and out of Congress.

Hon. M. C. George, just before his recent election, in his stereotyped speech promised the farmers of Oregon that he would stand by their interests and maintain the tariff of 1867. He too, succumbed to party dictation and the party lash, and in violation of his promises and the pledges he gave to the farmers of Oregon, voted to rob them of their just profit on their wool.

Wendell Phillips Supports Butler.

Wendell Phillips, whose worst crime was that of being an Abolitionist, is out in a letter defining his position and giving his opinion of the Republican party and Ben Butler. He says: "At present there can be only two political parties. The Republican is one. I distrust and despise the Republicans as time servers, as double dealers, as soulless carion masquerading in the grave clothes of their honored predecessors. They have no right to seek their candidate among high-minded and honorable men. Let them choose a fitting leader from among the Tewksbury Marshes—those peddlers of poor men's bones. The movement which upholds Butler is the protest of earnest men against all this. Including within its many very evil elements, this movement is supported by some of the best and most earnest men in the State. Its success will grind to powder the dead weight which strangles and chokes us, as the anti-slavery rising buried the Whig relics beyond resurrection."

Some of the Republican papers appear anxious that Dorsey should turn over to the Democratic party. His great crime, in their eyes, was in getting caught. Dorsey, however, manifests a strong determination to stick by the party of great moral ideas, and continues to play "boss." He has proven himself a faithful Republican and the party, with all the power of the present administration, came to his rescue when in peril. It was as a Republican that he perpetrated the star-route robberies and spent the \$400,000 to carry Indians and spent the rest on his cause. He knows that this party of great moral ideas never goes back on its thieves. No, he will not leave it.

The Labor Question.

The relation which labor sustains to capital and the rights of the laborer to share in the profit arising from his own industry, is a question which more nearly concerns the welfare of society and the perpetuity of our institutions than all others combined. The laborer is truly worthy of his hire. By the hand of industry mother earth is made to yield all the wealth and sustenance which go to make up national and individual opulence and prosperity. All material wealth is grown from the soil or dug from the mine by the hand of toil and fashioned by industry and skilled labor. Man brings nothing into the world and takes nothing out of it; he requires but a narrow mound within which to return to his native element. He may own his broad acres and palatial residence and boast of his fee in the soil, but the inevitable law of nature fixes it certain that he has but a life estate at best. Then, why in a free republic do we find the marked distinctions between capital and labor, the moneyed autocrat and the honest peasant? Why and by what means is it that the profit, above a mere existence, arising from the skill and industry of the artisan, mechanic and laborer goes into the coffers of the capitalists?

There is something radically wrong that the great masses should be forced to labor, and in many instances beyond their strength and endurance, for a mere pittance, that the few should revel in their luxury and gloat over their well filled coffers. The fact that the black man was forced to work for his food and raiment while his task-master reaped himself on the profits of his industry, cost the nation millions of blood and treasure. By striking the shackles from the limbs of the southern negro, our government has, by a system of unjust and unwise legislation riveted the bonds of absolute drudgery upon the great industrious and working masses of our people. The conditions engendered by this system of legislation cause murmurings of discontent throughout the land. To remedy this condition is a question paramount to all others and one which demands the best efforts of our statesmen for a practical and peaceable solution. The government, by wholesale extravagance and without remuneration, has given away all the best of the public domain to corporations. It has created a system of banking institutions or corporations which draws a two fold interest from the people, at the expense of the government. By a system of unequal and unjust taxation the government draws from the great laboring masses of our people the revenue to support this and other systems of extravagance.

How to regulate and control these gigantic corporations and enforce equality and justice between them and the people is the great question now dividing the two political parties and will be the coming issue in State and national politics. The Democratic party now, as in the past, the party of the people, will be found on the side of honest labor, battling for justice and equality.
