

The "Standard" on the Wool Tariff. The Standard, in its Sunday morning issue, in a lengthy editorial headed "Tariff on Wool," exhibits an amount of ignorance on that question not before met with in the public prints.

When a paper pretending to represent Democratic ideas strikes a direct blow at one of the greatest industries of our country, which has already suffered from unjust discrimination in favor of the New England manufacturer and for which the people have to pay, it behooves us to raise our most earnest protest against such a dogma.

The Oregonian of the 16th instant, is wrong when it asserts that "the DOUGLAS INDEPENDENT wants more protection." What it objects to is being robbed out of both pockets at the same time, as the action of the late Republican Congress on the wool tariff does the farmers of the whole country, for the benefit of the New England manufacturer. The farmers of Ohio have spoken upon this subject, and have said to the Republican party in most emphatic terms, "take your hands out of one of our pockets, at least."

FOREMOST among the political questions which should agitate the people of the State of Oregon at the next June election, is the regulation of railroad freights. To the agriculturist it transcends all others. If the State has the right to step in and set a price on the property of the farmer and compel that farmer to take the price set by those arbitrators, why has not the State the same power to step in between the producer and the railroad magnates and set a just and reasonable rate on freights? It is clear to us that there is an injustice here which should be remedied. Let the farmers agitate this question and send none others to the Legislature but those who know their rights and dare maintain them.

MISS WILLARD, of the Union Signal, is responsible for this: "Let us hear no more of woman's extravagance. General Francis Walker, the untiring chief of the census bureau, has taken our case in hand and has ably and amply maintained our defense.
