Black Bart the Po-8.

In order to satisfy forever the minds

of their agents and the general public re-

garding the identity of the stage robber,

C. E. Bolles or Bolton, who was re-

cently tracked, arrested, convicted, and

sentenced to the State Prison for six

years, Wells, Fargo and Co. have issued,

through their chief detective, J. B.

Hume, a circular which states that all

doctors are at rest—that the man is

George W. Jones, the proprietor of the

by the mere motive of making money

late a few dollars by foul means. In

short, he neither admires nor covets

the name of Mr. Jones was not directly

known in the premises, and the result

most surely imparts verity, as there

was no inducement for anything but

the truth. A chemist cannot deceive

a brother chemist, and hence he dare

not resort to subterfuge or any wise

deceive himself. Therefore it is quite

certain that the foregoing is reliable,

and medicinally it is indeed most sat-

isfactory. It is too often the custom

of pharmacists and occasionally of some

intelligent physicians, to envelop their

wisdom in language incomprehensible

except to those peculiarly learned.

Quacks, of course, assume a wisdom,

though they have it not. In this in-

stance there is not a chemical property

well defined family, whereof iodine is
