

FOREIGN TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Mexico has loaned \$4,000,000 from the Mexican National bank.

The Greek Chamber has voted a loan to redeem the paper currency.

The thermometer reached 10 to 30 degrees below zero recently in Toronto, Can.

Austin's lace factory at Long Eaton, near Nottingham, is burned. Loss, \$100,000.

The French Senate has adopted the extraordinary budget with some modifications.

The Rothschilds are negotiating for the purchase of the French government railway.

A number of Krupp guns have been landed in Madagascar and sent to the capital.

Nineteen persons have been dangerously poisoned by eating tainted meat in a Montreal convent.

The city and guilds of London Institute have established a school of wood engraving for women.

The body of Herr Lasker, the German statesman who died in New York, has arrived in Berlin.

Severe shocks of earthquake occurred recently in the town of Castiglione, Sicily, and the vicinity.

The heaviest snow fall for 15 years occurred in Ottawa, Can., last week. All the trains were delayed.

The Marquis of Harford, who was thrown from his horse while hunting, and kicked, died recently.

The Porte has decided not to send troops to Sudan, but to ask the powers to settle the Egyptian question.

Over 20,000 men are engaged in the watchmaking trade in Switzerland, doing much of the finest work.

An explosion of fire damp in the Perbury coal mine killed seven men. Twelve men, all injured, were rescued.

While thirteen children were skating at Rohn, in Pomerania, recently, the ice was broken and all were drowned.

The Tagblatt, a German organ, publishes a decree of the Emperor of China urging resistance to the aggression of France.

There have been three suicides and one murder this month at Nite and Monte Carlo, in consequence of losses at the gambling tables.

Twenty persons of the River Head riot party have arrived at the St. Johns, N. F., penitentiary to await the trial of their fellow rioters.

A sudden change is noted in the relations between the Khedive and the Sultan. The latter is manifesting a more friendly feeling toward the Khedive.

Le Temps denies the truth of the report that the French bombardier a Madagascar port because the insurgents were flying British and American flags.

The French Government is reported to have been assured that England urged China to accept the accomplished facts and arrange terms of peace with England.

It is said that Charles Russell, the British lawyer, recently received \$18,000 in fees in a single week, one of them being the \$10,000 fee for the case of the British.

Of 170 English Liberal members of parliament whose opinions have been obtained only three are opposed to giving Ireland the same rights and privileges as enjoyed by England.

A short crop and high duty is causing the heavy importation of American flour into Canada. In November, the monthly import was \$310,388, against \$102,217 in 1902.

There was a grand mass celebrated at the Madeleine, Paris, on January 21st, the anniversary of the execution of Louis XVI, which was made the occasion of a Royalist demonstration.

The Irish Times states that the tour of Henry George and Michael Davitt through England and Scotland has been abandoned, owing to the hostility of one section of the Irish party to George.

The statement in the lumbermen's memorial to Congress that Chinese labor is largely employed in British Columbia lumber mills is pronounced untrue. No Chinese are employed except as coolies.

A "Commercial Museum" is being organized at Brussels, which is intended to embrace a collection as complete as possible of all the products which form the commercial exchange of the world.

The Chinese fear that the French are entertaining designs upon Canton. The people are very uneasy. From Hanoi, reports that Admiral Courbet would advance upon Bannin without awaiting reinforcements.

The title by which Mr. Tennyson is raised to the peerage, and which has been approved by Her Majesty, is that of "Baron Tennyson of Aldworth, in the county of Sussex, and of Freshwater, in the Isle of Wight."

Figaro asserts that direct negotiations between China and France will be resumed on the basis of a new frontier, peace and amnesty to the Black Flags. China must also guarantee free navigation of Sang Koi river to Lao Kai.

Thirty-seven university students were recently arrested in Moscow for the murder of Sudeikin. They were arrested through the information of a cabman, who conveyed two of them from the house where the deed was committed.

Epidemic typhoid fever has broken out at St. Hyacinthe, Col. Montreal, and the schools have closed. Five nurses in the hospital, have died. Members of religious communities are very ill. The disease has taken alarming proportions.

Settlers in rural townships in Canada, are in danger of starving, the snow stopping all traffic. Lumber dealers telegraph that unless they get provisions they will be obliged to close down. Such a state of affairs never was known in this locality before.

The Figaro comments on the extraordinary increase of suicides in Paris, which it attributes to the tremendous pace at which they live. It estimates that during the year just passed, over 4,000 persons have destroyed themselves in Paris alone.

It is stated that the Egyptian Government has given orders that when Khartoum is evacuated that the guns are to be spiked and the powder destroyed. It is believed that all efforts will now be concentrated in the defense of Massowah and Suakin.

Drissan, on assuming the Presidency of the Chamber of Deputies recently, pointed out that it was the duty of the Chamber to preserve the present generation from the severe experience of the past and lead the country safely through whatever difficulties may be reached.

A book containing a series of bitter articles upon Berlin society, first appearing in the Nouvelles Revue de Paris, has been seized in Berlin. The articles are largely libelous of the Kaiser and the Imperial family, and the German Ministry. The book causes great irritation to the German court.

Two American officers passed Samarai recently, by mail train from Orenburg, conveying the ten coffins containing the remains of Lieutenant DeLong and comrades. The mayor and other officials placed wreaths of immortelles on the coffins, in the presence of a multitude of respectful spectators.

Madagascar advises state that the captain of the United States steamer Albatross, when at Tamatave, started to visit the town in the ship's boats, but was prevented from landing. He declined to land on the French boat. Queen Ravalana, in speech, said: "I shall prove myself a soldier, ever ready to defend the land of our ancestors."

When the Egyptians evacuate Khartoum and the adjacent cities it is estimated that 11,000 Christians and Europeans are likely to be victims of Moslem fanaticism unless they are immediately transported to Upper Egypt. It is thought that the Government will send a flotilla up the Nile to assist in their escape, the hopes of which are very slender.

An officer of the American navy is reported to be in Dundee, Scotland, for the purpose of chartering a whaling steamer to engage in the search of Greely, the Arctic explorer. It is believed Captain Adams will be appointed to command the expedition. He has expressed the belief that the Greely party is alive, and desires to lead the searching party.

William Morton, the Arctic explorer, has died in Alaska.

Taahuliah, Cal., has two women deputy revenue collectors.

New York received \$119,567 from 25,200 liquor licenses in 1893.

The Hecla mine in Montana produces seventy tons of first-class ore daily.

H. K. Thurber returns from New York's largest grocery house with \$100,000.

Anthony Comstock threatens to suppress the New York edition of Sarah Barnum.

Cincinnati sold \$9,222,000 worth of tobacco in 1893. The White Burley was the favorite.

New York police are clearing out the policy shops. Forty dealers were arrested recently.

In a single year the enormous sum of \$27,000,000 was paid out by Americans for matches.

Jim Flood is worth \$100,000, Mackay has \$60,000,000 and Senator Fairbanks \$400,000,000.

Alden Spear, of Boston, has given \$40,000 to found a professorship in the Boston University.

Judge Bradwell, of the Legal News, was elected president of the Chicago Press Club.

There were forty-five homicides in New York City last year, the first and last being by policemen.

At New York City, Mo., is soon to have a fine seminary on a lot donated by the citizens of that place.

Three young Irish Catholic girls were taken into the New York Jewish synagogues on a lot donated by the citizens of that place.

The only son of Governor Robinson, of Massachusetts, will graduate at Amherst College this year.

The sum of \$30,000 on a mining sale at Salt Lake City, recently, was paid with 1,500 \$20 gold pieces.

Mrs. Beal, of Kingston, Mass., gave \$10,000 New Year's day to the Unitarian church of that place.

The managers of the Henry Collier lottery, Louisville, have been arrested by the postoffice authorities.

A company has been formed to build a road from Bloomington to Peoria, Ill., and thence to the Mississippi.

David Sankey, butcher of the evangelist, who died at his home, New Castle, Pa., recently, was once on the gallows, which is taught by one of their number.

Seventy-six Sing Sing convicts have been recently released with money, which is taught by one of their number.

Reports from the region about Wichita, Kan., show quite a heavy loss of cattle and hogs from the late snow storms.

An examination of the affairs of D. M. & E. G. Halbert, of Birmingham, N. Y., shows total liabilities of \$300,000.

The Association of New York Exchanges was organized to further legislation desired by the various exchanges.

Governor Robinson, of Massachusetts, still fills his place as superintendent of the Chicopee Unitarian Sunday school.

A. De Kalb county, Tennessee, man cut a tree until he was ready to fall, and then threw himself under it to commit suicide.

The House at Trenton, N. J., has passed a bill providing for the burying of honorably discharged soldiers who die in poverty.

Miss Martha Jellison, who died recently at Ellsworth, Maine, aged 93 years, had taught school in that city for sixty years.

Robert A. Murry, a Boston broker, is residing in Wisconsin and has won his large fortune and \$40,000 more, it is said.

At Syracuse, N. Y., recently, William H. Craft undertook to succeed in the task of walking 302 miles in 100 hours, without sleep.

During the last year the sub-treasury office in New York City handled \$1,310,491,113 in money without the loss of a penny.

The mining town known as Blende City, near Joplin, Mo., has secured a postoffice, and has had its name changed to that of Lehigh.

The Ohio hotel keepers will meet at Cincinnati to form an association to secure legislation necessary to protect their interests.

A man whose eye was put out by a cinder falling from the Manhattan elevated railway has sued the company for \$50,000 damages.

Chicken stealing has become a regular industry at Helena, Ark., and thus far all efforts to locate the thieves have been unsuccessful.

The Maine game commissioners are enforcing a law forbidding railroads from exporting more than three deer from the State in a season.

Only \$4,000 have been raised in four months toward a monument to Peter Cooper, who did such incalculable public service to his country.

Belie English, of Cincinnati, after going to the Supreme Court, has secured a verdict of \$2,500 against her father for declaring her illegitimate.

The 17-year-old sheet mill of the Reading (Penn.) Iron Works were burned recently. It causes 150 hands to be thrown out of work for about six weeks.

The Pittsburgh glass-workers' strike has lasted five months, and now it is said an international union has been formed to include the leading glass districts of Europe.

A bill has been in the Albany, N. Y., Legislature, authorizing magistrates to fine speculators \$25 for each offense for selling theater tickets above the box office price.

It is understood that the office of assistant surgeon general of the army will be abolished. The Secretary of War said such a move would meet his entire approval.

A court martial has been ordered to meet at San Antonio, Tex., in February, for the trial of Captain A. S. Keyes, Tenth Cavalry, on charges of duplication of his pay account.

It is said that the Oregon and Transcontinental company, created by Henry Villard, will soon be dissolved, and its assets divided among the shareholders.

It is estimated that between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 of trade dollars are yet in circulation. The remainder of the 30,000,000 originally coined, it is thought, have been exported or remelted.

An entire block facing Railroad street, in Duquesne, Vt., including the Commercial hotel, was burned recently. Loss \$30,000; insurance not given.

St. Louis capitalists are going to build a hotel capable of accommodating 2,500 guests. The building will be 65 feet long by 215 feet wide and seven stories in height, thus making it the second largest hotel in the world.

The wild man who has been carrying off sheep and pigs and committing petty thefts in and around Steubenville, Ohio, is said to be a descendant of the great chief, described as the most brutal specimen of humanity ever seen.

Miss Alice Freeman, Ph. D., the president of Wellesley College, is a slight, girlish, young-faced woman, of great force of character and brilliant mental endowments. She is very popular with the young lady students.

The amount of subscriptions received by the Boston Post for Lieutenant Rhodes of the cutter Dexter, for gallant conduct in connection with the City of Columbus disaster, is \$1,180. The sum of \$427 was raised for the Gay Head Indians.
