

Francis Bonheur, brother of Rose Bonheur, is dead. Small-pox is raging at Commaise, the capital of Assiute.

The river Nile at Cairo is 51 feet 4 inches and is rising slowly. There is a dispute between Russia and India over the Mero oasis.

The Belfast ship-builders who recently struck have resumed work. Colonel Barnaby repudiated a body of rebels approaching Suakin.

The British Columbia Legislature has voted \$261,000 for public works. Bradlaugh was re-elected by a majority of seventy-six, the largest ever had.

There are seventy-four cases of yellow fever at last accounts at Rio Janeiro. Havre, France, received 184,000 boxes of meats from the United States in 1880.

Mr. Browley, counsel for Arabi Pasha, says Arabi will return to Egypt soon. Severe gales and snow-storms are prevailing in Scotland and the north of France.

The Dean of the Consular Corps has addressed a note to the English Government. The steamship Germanic was twenty-six days in transit from New York to Liverpool.

The Cleplington waste works at Dundee were burned recently. Four firemen were killed. Two thousand Jamaica negroes are employed, under French engineers, on the Panama canal.

The steamer France has arrived at London from New York with a loss of 114 head of cattle. Banker Radille of Paris, has suspended. Liabilities 3,300,000 francs, chiefly peasants' earnings.

Advices state that the commercial treaty between Spain and the United States will be signed shortly. Members of a fashionable club in Paris have been robbed for some time by means of marked cards.

Arabs will send 10,000 men to Jeddah, Arabia, to be in readiness for service in Sudan, if necessary. The new Government of Turkistan is desirous of initiating a pacific policy, in order to soothe English alarms.

It is reported from London that gales have caused serious damage in various parts of the United Kingdom. Eighty officials and 300 men have been discharged to curtail expenses on the Mexico and Vera Cruz railroad.

A number of authors have established a company in London to obtain a copyright convention with American authors. The Spanish Government has begun an anti-Republican crusade.

El Globe, was seized on Monday. The strike of coal miners at Auzin, France, has assumed large proportions. Of 11,400 miners, only 4,000 are at work.

Serious disturbances have arisen among the natives of South Africa. English and French men of war are landing their troops. The funeral services over the remains of Herr Laske, at the new synagogue in Berlin, on Monday, were attended by 5,000 persons.

There was an explosion of fire-damp in a colliery at Rowley, Staffordshire, England, on Monday. Five men were badly burned. A corner-stone and marble altar slab, for the memorial church to Daniel O'Connell at Cahirvee, have been sent from Rome by the Pope.

The Jesuit college at Carion de los Condes, Spain, fell on Monday. A priest, a workman and thirteen students were badly hurt. The iron masters in north of England have reduced the wages of their workmen on twenty-four hours notice, owing to depression of trade.

General Stephenson has apologized, in the name of the British army, to the Italian Consul, for the insult offered the Italian flag by a British officer. Assemblyman Donahue of New York was arrested while attending the carnival at Montreal. Donahue was identified with the Fenian raid into Canada in 1860.

The French Government has called the attention of the Egyptian cabinet to the danger of an uprising and massacre at Cairo, if the English garrison is weakened. Many Christians have been murdered in Assiute, since the beginning of January. The Chinese victory ordered the Black Flags to murder every Christian in the city of Sontay.

General Lord Wolsey has ordered the expedition to Tokar to be finished in three weeks, and troops to return to Cairo. The people of Khartoum hailed General Gordon as a deliverer. The proprietor of the great Cafe Bauer in Berlin has established a reading-room in which 700 journals are kept.

The situation in Manitoba is becoming serious. There is strong feeling among the people, who are extremely indignant at the manner in which they have been treated by the Ottawa Government. French bondholders of the Suez canal admit the necessity of a second canal. It is stated that Minister Ferry refuses to open diplomatic negotiations with the object because the canal was a purely private work.

Professor Lenz of Nuremberg, Germany, has an order from San Francisco for a bronze statue, ten feet high, of President Garfield. The model was made by Sculptor Hubersberger of Munich, a native of America. The Cuban revolutionists held an indignation meeting in New York City on Monday, in regard to the arrest of Col. Carlos Auzero by the United States authorities at Key West, on the charge of being a bandit.

General Gordon has posted a proclamation recognizing El Mahdi as Sultan of the Kordofan, remitting half of the taxes, and placing no restriction on the slave trade. The Arabs at Khartoum express great satisfaction. Reports from General Gordon state that after the restoring of order he will leave Colonel Stewart in command of Khartoum, and proceed to Kofan. His object is to interview El Mahdi, in order to learn the fate of Hichs Pasha.

Emile & Cordier, shippers at Rochefort, was a branch at Bordeaux, have failed. Liabilities 5,500,000 francs. The failure involves firms at Angoulme, La Rochelle and Niort. A stock broker named Meyer, who was involved, hanged himself. The Chinese regulation act of 1884, recently passed by the British Columbia Parliament, and sent to Ottawa for the Governor's sanction, imposes a tax of \$10 on every native-born Chinaman over 14 years of age, and a yearly tax of \$10 as long as he remains in the country.

Tricou, formerly French Minister to China, has just arrived at Paris, from Saigon. He states that the Black Flags always place Chinamen in Sultan in battle and massacre them if they refuse to fight. He says 400 Chinese have been killed in that way in battle. Orders governing the expedition for the relief of Tokar have been issued. The troops will take provisions sufficient to last two weeks, each man carrying twenty rounds of ammunition, and there will be a reserve supply of 250 rounds per man.

Reports throughout Central Asia say that the Russians would bring warlike tribes into the rich plains of India as soon as England is in difficulty, and this did more to cause the submission of the Turcomans than the ability of the Russian generals. Russia is using Afghans as an advance guard. The News of Paris publishes intelligence from Berlin which asserts that naturalized German-American citizens who have returned to Germany are again being rigorously subjected to military duty, and that the German foreign office ignores United States Minister Sargent, and conducts negotiations directly with Washington.

A general strike of railroad coal miners, against the reduction of a half a cent, is imminent in Ohio. The Montezuma Hotel, at Hot Springs, N. M., burned recently, is to be rebuilt as quickly as possible.

The Paterson, N. J., striking ribbon weavers have rejected their terms offered by the manufacturers. The gross earnings of the Union Pacific Railroad for the last year were \$20,761,100; expenses, \$16,670,000.

St. Louis claims to have manufactured last year 22,000,000 pounds of tobacco, which beats the record. Since the subsidence of the flood at Powhatan, Va., sand and water are thrown up at intervals in great quantities.

The Michigan Central passenger train began running over the new cantilever bridge at Niagara falls last week. Thomas O. Richards, a colliery superintendent, fell from a shaft at Pittville, Pa., recently, and was instantly killed.

The Swiss naturalist, Arnold Guyot, connected with Princeton College for thirty years, died recently, aged 76 years. The New York Court of Appeals declared unconstitutional the law forbidding the manufacture of cigars in tenements.

Sixty per cent of the cattle in Indian Territory have been declared intruders, and have received notice to leave. Advice from Bismark, Dakota, state that 7,000 Indians are actually starving. A massacre of the post traders is feared.

The prohibitionists in the Iowa Legislature have passed a resolution for the crippling of Representative Weaver by a fall. The citizens of Brentwood, Indiana, have presented a petition to Congress asking for further legislation against Chinese immigration.

The clothing cutters will soon hold a national convention in New York to arrange uniform rates of wages throughout the country. Thomas W. Keene made his New York debut at Niblo's Garden, recently, in "Richard III." His reception was very flattering.

The liabilities of Edgar Peck, of Patchogue, who had failed and tried to kill himself, are placed at \$150,000; assets, \$50,000. A bill has been passed by the Mississippi Legislature for the taxation of railroad property and State supervision of freight rates.

George P. Curry, a banker and cotton manufacturer of Augusta, Ga., has assigned his liabilities, \$200,000; assets nominally the same. Christine Nilsson sang to a 50,000 house of Christians recently, sixty-seven feet of water falling to dampen the enthusiasm of the opera-goers.

The Secretary of War reports an immediate appropriation of \$100,000 for the Columbia basin, Williams river; also \$15,000 for Coos bay, Oregon. J. Sexton was given a judgment for \$750 against San Francisco city, for extra freight on white ice being building the Chicago coat house.

In the flooded districts of Wheeling, W. Va., thieves have cut holes in the roofs of buildings and helped themselves to valuables and portable property. One man and a child were killed and several persons severely injured by the falling walls of Lehigh & Co.'s building, lately destroyed by fire in Philadelphia.

The House Committee on Public Lands have decided to report a bill declaring the entire reservation of 1,480,000 acres of the Oregon Central Railroad forfeited. At Rosita, Cal., recently, Frank Williams and John Gray, who shot and killed Orrin Kurtz in a saloon row, were taken from jail by a masked mob and hanged.

A bronze bust of the late Dr. Marion Sims is to be placed in the rear of the Harlowe in a saloon row, were taken from jail by a masked mob and hanged. Eleven hundred saloon keepers in New York have been notified that their licenses have been annulled, because of conviction in court for violation of the Excise law.
