

FOREIGN TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

President Grey received the Queen of Tahiti on her arrival in Paris.

The betrothal of Princess Elizabeth of Hesse, is officially announced.

Three dynamite suspects have left Havre on the St. Lawrence for America.

The new speaker (Fell) took the chair at the English House of Commons last week.

The franchise bill passed to the first reading in the English House of Commons.

Colonel Stewart's second expedition up the White Nile met with a better reception.

General Graham has been instructed to return to Triniklat to wait for further orders.

Extraordinary precautions are being taken to insure the safety of Buckingham Palace.

Admiral Hewitt accompanied Captain Speedy on his mission to King John of Abyssinia.

Princess Clotilde, sister of the King of Italy and wife of Prince Napoleon, is dangerously ill.

All the powers have been instructed to compel the government upon General Graham's victory.

The Oshawa Cabinet Company has assigned. Nominal assets, \$30,000; liabilities about \$25,000.

The Merchants' Hotel and other large buildings were burned out at Duluth, Manitoba, last week.

The steamer Berthe collided at Gibraltar with the Norwegian ketch Alalaia. Nine persons were drowned.

An Egyptian gunner from Tokar states that he and seven others were compelled to serve the rebel guns.

Hong Kong advises state that a collision has occurred between Chinese soldiers and Europeans at Shanghai.

General Gordon believes that the slavery question will settle itself within a year, by the rising of the slaves.

The sixth anniversary of Pope Leo was celebrated at Rome with great pomp. The Pope looked feeble and aged.

General Gordon asks further supplies of money, and the treasury at Cairo sent \$400 and a number of decorations.

An Anglo-Portuguese commission has been appointed to regulate and protect navigation upon the Congo river.

Sheiks of several tribes sent envoys offering to desert Osman Digma and assist the English, if paid for their services.

The London police are in possession of information in regard to the dynamite outrages that will lead to important arrests.

The English government will introduce into the House of Commons a motion to amend the purchase clause in the land act.

The Canadian government has decided to send an exploring expedition to Hudson Bay and Strait, to remain out for three years.

The French Consulate at Cairo has refused to serve a ministerial writ for suppressing *Bosphore*, the Egyptian newspaper.

Three hundred and thirty sick and wounded sailed recently from Triniklat for Suez, where they were placed in the hospital.

Twenty-seven hundred bodies were buried at Tel, including Egyptians killed in the fight between Baker Pasha's troops and the rebels.

A dispatch from Madrid says: Speculators have subscribed \$120,000 to raise revolutionary movements similar to that of August, 1883.

Joaquin Limerdix, a director of the Havana Savings Bank, committed suicide recently and the bank has suspended payment in consequence.

Reports have reached Suakem that the Bedouins of Jeddah are in revolt against Turkey. It is expected that a state of siege will be declared.

A number of Socialists recognized a detective in a tavern at Pesth, Hungary, recently, and badly beat him. He is now in a precarious condition.

It is now almost certain that the dynamite outrages committed in London were the work of four men who arrived from America on February 20th.

Anglo-American cable shares on the London market have risen on reports of dispatches between the projectors of the Mackay cable and ambassadors.

Peter Jones, alias Burke, and Thomas McGinnis, were arrested recently in Cork on suspicion of being implicated in the late dynamite outrages in London.

Captain Speedy has started for Abyssinia with a letter from Queen Victoria to King John. Captain Speedy will probably remain in Abyssinia as an English resident.

Cumberland, the English minister, read, entertained a select party recently at the apartments of Crown Prince Adolph, at Vienna, showing most of the tricks of spiritualism.

Princess Marie Anna arrived at Berlin recently, and rejoined her husband and mother at the railway station. Later in the day she was received by the Emperor and Empress.

Captain Mason, English agent at Mas-souah, is organizing an Abyssinian contingent force under English officers, to operate on Khatoum if El Mahdi continues fighting.

Marquis Hartington, Secretary of War, states that General Graham has not been ordered to retire to Triniklat, as rumored. He has not been directed to attack Osman Digma.

American Consul Dunne has asked the captives of warring tribes in the look-out for Lieutenant Greely in Baffin's Bay, in view of his drift from Smith's sound on an ice floe.

Lieutenant Lloyd, brother of Clifton Lloyd, Under Secretary of the Interior at Cairo, will present to Queen Victoria the standard captured at Tokar. The British buried 2,300 rebel dead.

Prussia's proposal to the Bundesrat regarding the anti-Socialist law, is to prolong the law until 1893, on the ground that many attacks upon life and property are traceable to the Socialists.

General Graham has arrived at Suakem. Troops are embarking at Triniklat for Suakem already. The British leaving Suakem was discovered that Osman Digma is stationed ten miles from Suakem.

Paul de Cassagnac, Bonapartist, writes in *Le Matin* urging that the Bonapartists and Royalists should have obtained the effecting the downfall of the republic, the Napoleonic and the Orleansists.

Princess Napoleon has recalled his son, Prince Victor, from Roumania to Paris, having been warned that the government will not permit French soldiers to enter the military service of a foreign government.

Advices from Madagascar state that the natives have succeeded in landing a number of Krupp cannon and other munitions of war. An English vessel has obtained command of the Malagasy army and will soon attack the French.

Police surveillance has been extended to Hamburg, Antwerp, Brast, the borders by the English authorities. The registers of hotels at Brussels, Paris and other centers have been examined. Inspection is authorized of dynamite works in France.

The British Ambassador at Constantinople has asked the Porte for satisfaction for the manner in which the officials of Smyrna have been treating the English vessels. They prevented steamers from embarking passengers and have removed the union Jack from English vessels.

The English detective at New York has been provided with portraits of the supposed dynamiters. The police believe that the dynamite used was made in France. *The Drift*, a newspaper, maintains that England has every right to demand organization of dynamiters.

Funeral services over the remains of Minister Hunt took place at the American church in St. Petersburg last week. The coffin was wrapped in the stars and stripes and conveyed to the church in a hearse drawn by six horses. A large number of Russian Ministers, diplomatic corps, court officials, and resident Americans were present.

Police Judge Dan Hoffman has disappeared mysteriously from his home in Hollister, Cal.

Hon. Kenneth Raynor, Solicitor of the Treasury, died last week at the National Hotel in Washington.

Lizzie Nutt, of Uniontown, has written to the President, asking to be appointed postmistress of that place.

Mrs. Lilla Langtry, the English actress, recently took an assignment of mortgage of real estate in New York.

Two Chicago lads, Elmer Lyons and Alfred Stend, died in all the agonies of hydrophobia a couple of days ago.

After prayers at his home in Sycamore, Ill., recently, Jacob Belles issued forth a note to resolve to murder his family.

C. A. Selmer, the Norwegian Minister of State, has been impeached and sentenced to forfeit his place and pay costs of \$8,000.

Benjamin Beatty, while attempting to change a five-year-old, was shot by him and seriously wounded. The boy has fled.

A stone found near Eagle, Wis., and sold to a Milwaukee jeweler for \$1, is now declared to be a sixteen-carat pure-water diamond.

In an address at St. Joseph, Mo., recently, P. J. Sheridan advocated dynamite and assassination to secure the autonomy of Ireland.

Brigadier General R. S. Mackenzie, U. S. A., was examined by the retiring board at New York recently and placed on the retired list.

The Prosper Twin-Cylinder Car Company, of Chicago, with an authorized capital of \$1,000,000, failed last week for lack of \$4,967 cash.

Charles A. Dana and a party of New York capitalists are soon to start for a tour of Mexico, and will be joined by Sir Menzies Cameron.

Workmen in the Pullman Palace Car works at Chicago. They complain that their wages have been reduced from \$1.50 per day to \$1.30.

A riot occurred at Alapapa, Ga., caused by a disorderly party of rioting carmen. The Mayor telegraphed for militia to suppress the rioters.

In a train collision at the St. Louis Air Line, near Louisville, recently, both engines were wrecked, and several passengers were bruised.

Trustees of the Philadelphia Presbyterian hospital have decided to return to the managers of the charity ball the check for \$25,000 as its share of the proceeds for this season's entertainments.

Suits of criminal libel have been entered at Uniontown, Pa., against the editors of the *Republican* and *Standard*, by R. H. Acklin and Lawrence Knott, members of the jury which acquitted young Duke.

Nearly all the bishops of the Episcopal church in the United States will go to Aberdeen, Scotland, to assist at the celebration of the consecration of Bishop Seabury of Connecticut, the first American bishop.

The St. Nicholas hotel, the oldest and best known in New York, will be torn down the first of April to make room for a six-story building for stores. The property is now worth from \$80,000 to \$100,000, and a hotel does not pay.

John W. Hawkins, United States Lumber Inspector and private secretary of Nelson Holland, of Clarke, Holland & Co., lumber dealers of Buffalo, N. Y., is charged with the embezzlement of money of Holland aggregating \$40,000.

A bronze statue of Simon Bolivar, the liberator of Colombia, to be presented by the government of Venezuela to the city of New York, is now completed. It cost \$25,000. The site has not yet been decided upon, but will probably be in Central Park.
