

DOMESTIC TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

In Nebraska an increased acreage of wheat over that of last year has been reported.

Colonel Mapeson did not sail from New York for Europe last week, as was expected.

The coinage of the mints for April was \$4,502,410, of which \$2,400,000 were standard dollars.

The Treasury last week purchased 300,000 ounces of silver for delivery to the various mints.

The decrease of the public debt since June 30, 1883, is \$87,000,000; cash in Treasury, \$369,752,261.

Enoch Brown (colored) was hanged at the Halifax court house, North Carolina, recently, for wife murder.

The Chicago Board of Trade has taken exclusive charge of handling the telegraphic and other commercial quotations.

A bill was introduced in the Senate recently by Plumb, for opening to homestead settlement portions of Indian Territory.

William McLaughlin was hanged in the enclosure at the rear of the court house in Cincinnati last week for the crime of wife murder.

The House Committee on Public Lands has decided to consider the bill to forfeit the land grant of the Northern Pacific Railroad.

The son of Mrs. Catherine Friess of Baltimore died recently, and three of her daughters are in danger of dying from eating sauerkraut.

The United States Treasurer is now prepared to forward fractional silver coins in the sum of \$500, or its multiple, at the expense of the government.

The sale of trotting horses at Woodlawn, near Cincinnati, belonging to the estate of Horace Hough was very successful.

It is reported that an explosion of fire damp occurred last week in the mine of Parker, Pennsylvania, and that a number of the miners were killed.

Jacob Dobson, one of the Hill boys gang, who shot Eschery Atkins in the county of West Virginia, two weeks ago, was lynched last week at Griffithsville, Logan county.

A reduction of 10 to 15 per cent in the salaries employed on the Union Pacific Railroad was ordered by Manager Clark at Omaha last week. The men struck against the reduction and the order was countermanded.

The report is received from Medicine Lodge, Kansas, that the four bank robbers were captured and placed in jail. A mob in the jail did not molest them, and the other three out and hanged them.

Mrs. Frank Leslie, speaking of her contemplated marriage with the Marquis de Deville, says: "In my new life I shall be compelled, not involuntarily however, to devote my attention to my business and husband."

A fire last week destroyed the rear portion of S. R. S. Oweles & Bros., livery stable on Fifth street, Kansas City. Twenty-five horses perished in the flames. Quite a number of vehicles and a quantity of hay were destroyed.

Senator Lapham recently introduced a bill to provide that the provisions of the act approved August 8, 1882, to encourage and promote telegraph communication between America, be extended to cover a period until the 8th of August, 1886.

Henry Pfaff, a German, who a short time ago shot and killed Charles F. Fenwick, a Frenchman, living in San Francisco, because the latter abused Bismarck, was last week convicted of murder in the first degree, with punishment of life imprisonment.

The Greely relief flagship Thetis sailed from New York harbor last week. Secretary Chandler and Lincoln, General Hancock and other celebrities accompanied the vessel to Sandy Hook on the gun boat Talapoosa. Harbor salutes were given to the departing craft.

B. F. Siciely, alias Stovols, was arrested recently at Oberlin, Ohio, by Inspectors Bidell and King for swindling. His scheme was to advertise for coins, such as good specimens of trade and Bland dollars, offering a premium for them. When he received them, of course, he made no return.

The failure of Palmer, Batchelder & Co., Boston jewelers and importers of watches, etc., was announced recently. Business was extremely light, compared with expenses, and it was determined to liquidate. It is impossible now to state either the liabilities or the assets.

Thomas Dickson was hanged at Bloomfield, Missouri, recently, for the murder of James McNabb, near Essex, Toddler county, four years ago. Four thousand people were present. Dickson made a brief speech on the scaffold, in which he declared his innocence.

Gertrude Ash, accomplice of Jesse Willams, the negro who committed assault upon Miss Maggie Flarty, on March 8th last, at the Union Hotel, Broadway and Thirty-second streets, New York, was found guilty and sentenced to eighteen and one-half years in the penitentiary.

The divorce suit in New York brought by Roger M. Sherman against the late Governor Sherman, daughter of the late Governor Bagley, of Michigan, was again in the courts last week, on a motion to vacate order for examining depositions, and for a commission. The decision was reserved.

The Iron Manufacturers Association of the west, organized during the great strike of 1882, met in Pittsburgh recently. The dispute with the Amalgamated Association over wages for the ensuing year was discussed, and it was determined to maintain the demand for a general reduction of 10 per cent.

The Western Union Telegraph Company recently advised that the rates for telegrams 30 per cent in rates to prominent points South and West. All night messages as far west as Kansas City will be forwarded for 15 cents for ten words, and one cent for each additional word. There will be no change in the tariff in Eastern messages.

The Sheriff of Mason county, at Point Pleasant, West Virginia, telegraphed recently that the State Statistician, John Stridger, is in a prospect of a mob lynching James Kirby, who was fined \$100 and imprisoned for thirty days for the murder of young Hall. The people are infuriated at the verdict of the jury in the case.

Benjamin Wallace, a wealthy soap manufacturer of New York, has been missing since April 20th, when he left the office of George McAdams, his lawyer, in company with a stranger. He had a large amount of money and valuable jewelry on his person, and foul play is feared. His business is in a flourishing condition and he is said to be worth \$7,000,000.

A general strike of silk weavers in Paterson, Union Hill and Hoboken, New Jersey, is soon expected. Owing to the terrible depression in the silk trade, manufacturers claim that their establishments have been running at a loss for months, and that they have been keeping their workmen employed for the sake of support to them and their families.

Judge Simonson, of Harrisburg, filed an opinion recently in the case of the State of Pennsylvania vs. the Western Union Telegraph Company. Both companies were made of appeals from tax assessments made on the capital stock of the telegraph company for 1878 and 1881. The court gives judgment against the company in the first case for \$13,481, and in the second case for \$14,045.

John Davis, a colored citizen of Richmond county, South Carolina, apparently dead, and was dug last out of burial. Colored people gathered at his cabin at night to pray and sing, when Clem and his workmen employed for the sake of support to them and their families.

FOREIGN TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Maria Tzagioni, the famous dancer, died at Marseilles recently.

Anarchist placards have been found posted in various portions of Nice.

Reports from the interior of Egypt state that the cotton worm has reappeared.

Bemont Castle, near Dundee, burned recently. Many valuable paintings were destroyed.

Sara Bernhardt, while playing La Dame aux Camellias recently, was hissed at by the Parisians.

Li Fong Pao, Chinese Ambassador, left Berlin for Paris last week to open negotiations with Germany.

The Crandall House and sixteen other structures at Trenton Falls, Ontario, were destroyed by fire recently.

Every village between Berber and Khar-ton is reported to be in rebellion, and rebels are entering Berber.

Another band of insurgents have appeared in Catalonia, Spain. Efforts are being made to capture them.

Sir Edward Walker, a member of the English Parliament, offers \$25,000 toward the rescue of General Gordon.

Sir Evelyn Baring has advised the English government to abandon the Sudan after retreating from General Gordon.

Heavy frosts have occurred in south England during the last few nights, and there is a general blight in fruit.

The German government insists upon the adoption of anti-Socialist laws, with the entire provisions unchanged.

Between 4,000 and 5,000 Chinamen are at the present time being trained in the Canadian Pacific trying to obtain employment.

Three hundred track layers and laborers on the Ontario and Quebec Railway, near Toronto, Can., have struck for higher wages.

A London cable says: Orders have been sent to Cairo to establish a special messenger post to convey dispatches to General Gordon.

As a result of the terrific explosion near Havana a day or two ago, the dead so far numbered twenty-one, and the injured seventy-nine.

France accepts the proposed conference in principle, but stipulates that it shall not be confined to the discussion of the Cuban situation.

Ship owners of England have approved the proposal to lay up one-fourth of their tonnage in view of the present condition of the freight market.

Advices from Cape Town mention a strike and serious disorders in the diamond fields. Men are searched daily at the conclusion of work.

A Winnipeg dispatch says: Dr. Wilson has been appointed Provincial Secretary, in place of the late Attorney General Miller, on provincial rights.

Farrel Williams, an Irish-American, he had a loaded revolver and treasonable documents in his possession.

All the federal Princes agree that if the German Reichstag rejects the necessary prolonging the anti-Socialist law, a dissolution of that body shall ensue.

Hussien Pasha telegraphed that he is still at Berber. It is too late to retreat, as the Egyptian army is surrounded, and the garrison utterly demolished.

Fifty workmen were buried under a falling wall of Whitley's building in London last week. Most of the workmen were extricated. A large number were wounded.

The latter part of last month a band of Mexican revolutionaries, led by General Tapache by troops and fifty-two of them killed.

Two bands of insurgents appeared at Lerida and Gerona, Spain, recently, and cut the telegraph wires and destroyed the railroad bridge at Gerona. Troops are in pursuit.

Forty-one bodies have been extricated from the recent broad wreck in Spain near Madrid. The number of wounded are thirty-eight. The dead are mostly peasants.

The Italian Consul at Malta proposed to desert in the government stores 200 cases of dynamite from a vessel, but the Governor ordered the ship to sail within forty-eight hours.

Lord Rawton, of London, who is editing papers left by Beaconsfield, has no memoirs among his effects, although a mass of partly arranged notes and letters was discovered.

A Montreal dispatch says: The bottom of the steamer crossing the Atlantic on the Nicolet river broke through last week. Louis Demeris, wife and daughter, Joseph Gauthier and child, and two other children were killed.

Upon the assembling of the Chamber of Deputies last week, Vice Admiral Payron, Minister of Marine and the Colonies, submitted a bill for additional credit for 900,000 francs to defray the expenses of the Tonquin expedition.

William Leigh, for twenty years town clerk of Victoria, died suddenly last week of hemorrhage of the lungs. He was 60 years of age, and had resided in Victoria for thirty-two years.

Last Friday's edition of the Republican newspaper, El Patriota, published at Havana, was seized by the government, and sentenced for previous offense, imprisoned for six months, to be deprived of the right to vote and to hold the seat of trial.

The National Bank of Monte de Piedad, the oldest financial institution in Mexico, closed its doors last week. There had been a run on the bank for several days owing to a report that the government would demand assistance from it.

A profound sensation was created in Toronto recently through the discovery of the powerful dynamite cartridges, with wire and fuse attached, under the Crown Land Office of the Parliament building, and two under the steps leading to the speaker's chair.

Professor Virchow, of Berlin, says that trichinosis in Germany, caused by eating imported American pork, is confined to a few isolated cases at Bremen. He points to the fact that the State Statistician, who is a pig, and urges compulsory examination of German and American pork.

Count d'Aquila, uncle of the ex-King of Naples, has summoned the Italian government to appear at the tribunal on May 15th to answer to his claim for the restitution of his patrimony, sequestered by General Garibaldi. He claims 6,000,000 lire, besides arrears of interest since 1870.

The marriage of Princess Victoria of Hesse, to Prince Louis, of Battenberg, took place at Darmstadt last week. The bride was dressed in white, with flags and thronged with sightseers. After the wedding the newly married couple started for Juegenheim, amidst the plaudits of the people.

The murderer, Campi, was beheaded at Paris recently. Campi murdered a retired lawyer who lived in Rue du Regar, and almost killed the murdered man's sister. Campi was executed for the sake of deference to his brother, who is an officer in the army. Campi confessed that plunder was the object of the murder.

Daly, a suspected dynamiter, was escorted to Birkbeck last week, by armed police, for trial. Daly was committed until the Chester assizes. Majendie, Chief Inspector of Explosives, deposed that he had experimented with a bomb found in Daly's possession. It had inflated 100 rounds on twelve life-size wooden dummies.

It has been discovered by Victoria, B. C. authorities that all English and Canadian mails that left Victoria on the 21st and 24th of March by Puget Sound steamers for transportation eastward, via the Northern Pacific Railroad, have never reached their destination. There were over 100 registered letters in the two mails.
