Daniel McSweeney's Opinion of Blaine.

[Owing to a serious omission in the letter of Daniel McSweeney, in our last week's edition, we republish the same duly corrected.]

The following letter from Daniel McSweeney, the gallant Irish patriot, has been received by one of the employees of the Missouri Republican at St. Louis:

CARROW CANNON HOUSE, August 10, 1884.

MY DEAR MR. GALLAGHER: For the past month I was engaged in almost a life-and-death struggle against the enemy. For the last five years I have been almost single-handed fighting the worst landlords ever in Donegal—the landlords of this union. No coercion act would reach me, but at last they resorted to a new plan to drive me out of the country, if possible. They brought an action for libel against me, and to venue in Derry, selected twelve Orangemen to try the case, and, of course, the result was not for a moment doubtful. The judge who tried the case, declared that I had libeled the government, and, of course, must be punished. The jury retired, and in two minutes brought in a verdict against me for £100 and costs, which will amount to about \$2000. Thus they think they have silenced me in future, but I am not through with them yet.

Enough on this subject, as you will probably see a letter from me in the Irish-American papers in a few days.

Let me thank you for sending me the Republican and Celt. But tell me, is it possible, that any number of our countrymen will vote the Black Republican ticket? I cannot believe it possible, in the face of the treatment received by Irish-Americans since the Blaine administration. I will write a public letter soon on the subject, but in the meantime you are at full liberty to publish any letters of mine from "Victoria's doghouse." I feel strongly, I assure you, on this subject, and had it not been for the loss I have just sustained here in my fight with the enemy, I certainly would have gone to the States to work against Blaine and his party, armed with Lowell's original letter, to tell the story of my imprisonment and Republican sneers at my appeal for protection.

The Oregonian lately gave the news of the failure of the New Brunswick National Bank of New Jersey.
