Obituary.

Died at Canyonville, September 19th, 1884, Mrs. James F. Gazley, aged 53 years.

Mrs. Gazley and her husband were married in Bradford Co., Pennsylvania in 1848. Mr. Gazley came to California in 1849. In 1851 he came to Oregon and took his present Donation claim. In 1852 he returned to Pennsylvania and brought his family across the plains the following year. Here Mrs. Gazley endured all the perils and privations of pioneer life, especially in 1855-6, during the Indian war when the settlers were compelled to build log forts for their protection, and not a flour mill in Southern Oregon, the men not daring to leave their families and go 150 miles for their needed supplies.

Mrs. Gazley bore all these privations without a murmur, and when peace smiled on our Valley with plenty on every hand she enjoyed the full fruition of her privations as a pioneer.

To the day of her demise she was a kind, gentle neighbor and mother, with love to all and malice towards none.

Respected and beloved, she gently sank into that slumber called death, but never to be forgotten by the loved ones left behind who will hallow her grave with her tears. J. F. G.

Obituary.

Died at his stock ranch on John Days' river, Grant county, Oregon, September 17, 1884, Abner T. Fitzhugh.

Deceased was born in Morgan county, Illinois, May 4th, 1829. He came to California in 1852—in the flower of youth—thence to Oregon in 1857 and resided in Jackson county for several years. He removed to Grant county in 1863 where he resided until death.

Mr. Fitzhugh's life was that peculiar to the pioneer—romantic and eventful. Thrice in Grant county he was robbed and pillaged by hostile Indians. In protecting the property of himself and neighbors and in avenging the wrongs perpetrated he developed the elements of a good Indian fighter—coolness, caution and bravery. As a citizen he was conscientious and firm in his views and determined in the performance of every duty of life. He died away from immediate kin but was surrounded by good neighbors and kind friends. He was much esteemed by all who knew him and most by those who knew him best. He was an elder brother of our fellow townsman Hon. J. S. Fitzhugh, Judge of this county, to whom we extend sincere sympathy.

Portland's Fires.

About 10 o'clock last Sunday night a fire was started in some hay on the dock adjoining the Esmond Hotel in the city of Portland. The fire was well under headway when discovered and destroyed the entire block including the Esmond. The guests all escaped, many losing their baggage, and some their wearing apparel. Wm. I. Friedlander and family, of this place, were stopping at the hotel and lost most of their clothing. W. R. Willis was registered at the Esmond, but escaped by being out in the city seeing the sights when the fire occurred. He however lost his overcoat which he had left in his room. The loss in property aggregated \$160,000.

Shortly after 9 o'clock Monday night a fire was observed in the Coloma dock, between Oak and Pine streets, Portland. The captain of the Stark steamer fired the whistle of the boat. The fire department was soon on the ground and by extra exertion confined the flames to the dock and warehouse above, which were destroyed with the loss of a large amount of machinery belonging to Knapp, Burrell & Co., who occupied the warehouse. The fire was started in some old boxes underneath the dock. There is unmistakable evidence that both of these fires are the work of incendiaries.
