State vs. Henry Lynch; indicted for the crime of larceny from a dwelling house, pleaded not guilty; trial and verdict guilty.

State vs. Lou Reed indicted for the crime of being armed with a dangerous weapon and assaulting another with such weapon; pleaded not guilty, trial and verdict.

Amanda J. Young vs. Wm. R. Young; divorce, default of defendant entered and the cause referred to John Lane to take testimony and report findings. Report of the referee filed and decree of divorce entered and care of minor children awarded to the plaintiff.

E. G. Young vs. Thomas Batty and Alice Batty; default of defendants taken and judgment of foreclosure entered for \$2304. and \$230 attorneys' fees, and disbursements taxed at \$17.75 and that the mortgaged premises be sold to satisfy the judgment.

S. Marks and Co. vs. H. G. Crow and E. J. Crow; suit to set aside a conveyance; motion withdrawn and answer filed. Henry Gardiner, a grand juror, was excused from further attendance upon the court on account of sickness.

W. H. Byars vs. The Esther Gold and Silver Mining Co.; defendants failed to answer; judgment for plaintiff for \$486, and his costs and disbursements. S. J. Miller et al vs. Wm. McBee et al; trial had and verdict for plaintiff for the possession of the real property described in the complaint, and \$1. damages.

State of Oregon vs. W. E. Crump, Lou Reed and Frank Lehnher; indicted for the crime of gambling; defendants Crump and Lehnher pleaded guilty, and defendant Reed demurred to the indictment.

Isaac Lehnher vs. Roso Lehnher; default of defendant taken and entered and the cause referred to Hon. L. F. Lane to take testimony and report findings. Report of referee filed; decree of divorce granted and custody of the minor child awarded the plaintiff.

C. H. Muesjoffar vs. J. R. Baker; dismissed for want of prosecution. State of Oregon vs. Thomas Godfrey; indicted for selling spirituous liquors without a license; pleaded guilty; fined \$50. and to be imprisoned twenty-five days unless said fine is paid.

Joseph Cellers vs. B. R. Fitch; demurrer overruled and time to answer extended until Monday, October 27th. Trial by jury waived. The following jurors were excused from further attendance upon the court: John Stanley, C. H. O'Len and E. C. Tracy.

School Land Commissioners vs. Wm. R. Wells et al; decree of foreclosure, judgment for plaintiffs for the sum of \$1500 and \$150 attorneys' fees, to the subsequent lien, creditors' various amounts on judgments in their favor. That the mortgaged premises be sold. That plaintiffs claim to be first paid, and the subsequent lien creditors in the order of their lien; out of the proceeds.

Davis McGuire vs. W. R. Wells et al; decree of foreclosure; judgment in favor of plaintiff \$2362.88 and in favor of subsequent lien creditors in various amounts. Isaac Gullett vs. H. Landers, executor; cause dismissed at plaintiff's cost. At the recent Ohio election the Democrats elected 11 Congressmen by majorities aggregating 24,149. The Republicans elected 10 Congressmen by majorities aggregating 31,679, making the Republican majority in the State 7,530.

The official count will show the majority on Secretary of State to be much less than these figures and will not probably exceed from four to five thousand on the State.
