THE election is now over, James G. Blaine will have plenty of time, to vindicate his tarnished honor and the fair fame of his family. Would it not be well for the Republican newspapers of Oregon to wait until he settles his suit with the Sentinel company, before hoisting the Plumed Knight's banner for 1888?

This company start out fully prepared, financially, to do the work laid out in their articles of incorporation. This is a good work and the company can aid materially in the development of the mineral resources of Oregon.—Telegram.

BLAINE SHELVED. A number of country newspapers in Oregon are using their best endeavors to keep the Plumed Knight before their readers; for what purpose we are at a loss to know. To read one of their scholastic effusions on James G. Blaine one is led to infer that they have not yet heard that the election is over, the way they write about the statesman qualities of the doubtful Knight. Others are bent upon convincing their readers that he did not write the Mulligan letters. They may as well drop this subject and learn that the election is over. That it was not the Mulligan letters or the suit against the Sentinel that defeated Blaine. He died of over production and too much protection; and was slaughtered in the house of his friends. That he does not possess the qualities of mind or heart to make him a great or successful leader. He will never again figure in the history of the country as a presidential candidate. He is as completely shelved as was Henry Clay in 1844 on the tariff question. Mr. Blaine has shown some brilliant and redeeming qualifications during the campaign, and exhibited an unusual amount of energy in making a personal canvass. But he exhibited an amount of temper at the chagrin of his defeat not in keeping with the dignity of the position he had occupied. His August speech will not soon be forgotten by the American people; it was but little short of rank treason. No national party can ever sanction the sentiment he expressed, with any show of success. No, he will not be a candidate in 1888, those papers who are trying to keep his corpse warm with the hope of reward will get their labor for their pains.

Cincinnati Frauds to be Investigated. Congress met on Monday the first day of December. On Tuesday the 2d, Follett, as a question of privilege, presented the following preamble and resolution: "I do impeach Lot Wright, United States Marshal of the southern district of Ohio, of high crimes and misdemeanors, I charge him with usurpation of power and violation of law, in that he appointed a large number of general and special deputy marshals to serve at several voting precincts in Cincinnati, at the election for a member of Congress, the 14th of October, 1884, and armed said deputy marshals with pistols and other deadly weapons, said to have been furnished by the war department of the United States government; in that the large number of deputy marshals so appointed and armed were notorious criminals and men known of vicious and brutal habits and reputation, and many of them non-residents of Cincinnati and the state of Ohio; in that said deputy marshals, acting under his orders and directions, aided and abetted and encouraged fraudulent voting, intimidation of voters, and gross outrages upon the elective franchises and rights of honest voters of the city, in furtherance of the interests of a political party and its candidates. Therefore, RESOLVED, That the committee on expenditures in the department of justice be required and directed, as soon as can reasonably be done, to investigate such charges and report to this house."

Republican leaders tried to get around the investigation by filibustering. The speaker held the maker a question of privilege and the resolution was adopted.

AN OUTRAGE. The United States Collector of Internal Revenue for this district has been making himself unusually officious in reference to a transaction between a couple of citizens of this county. One of them who was a renter on the other man's place, and whose means were limited and was unable to get credit at the store, got the other to buy him some tobacco. In their settlement the tobacco amounting to some two dollars was charged up to him. This individual became angry at his land lord and informed him, the collector, who it appears exacts a fine and in addition requires the farmer to take out a license for the retail of tobacco and wants to exact an oath that he is a retailer of tobacco which the farmer cannot do as he is not and has not been engaged in that business. Were this rule to prevail we doubt if there is a farmer in the county who employs men to work upon their farms out what are liable to the same strictures. The collector has taken this step with a full knowledge of the facts and his conduct warrants investigation. If he has no better idea of equity, law and justice it is time he was replaced by some one who will administer the law with more spirit of fitness.

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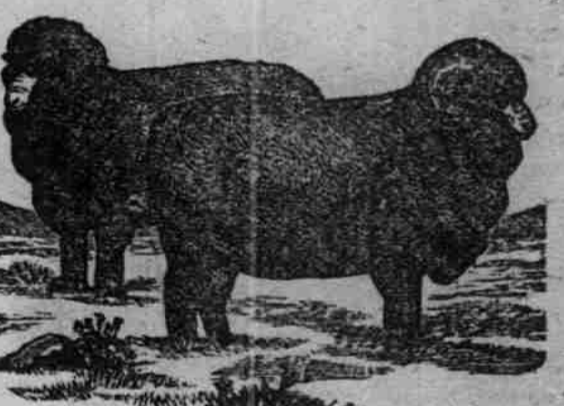
