

Democratic party and the people of Michigan at large have gained a great victory by the election of Judge Morse to the Supreme Bench of the state over Thomas M. Cooley. The platform upon which Judge Morse was nominated pledged the party to support President Cleveland's administration. It declared against class legislation by tariff laws, or by the extension of corporate privileges, either by legislation or judicial construction. Judge Cooley has always been personally popular in the state and as a law writer he has obtained a national reputation. But the Supreme Court, of which he was for many years a member, by forced judicial construction through an unbroken line of decisions has favored by its judgments corporations and corporate wealth to the detriment of the people of the state. The defeat of so eminent a jurist as Judge Cooley in a state which has heretofore been Republican, by so large a majority, upon this issue, is a triumph for the people and shows the power of popular election. It is the entering wedge which will in time sweep away the last vestige of a system of class privileges created by pernicious legislation, and extended and upheld by rotten and corrupt judicial construction. It is the duty of all good citizens to accord to every department of the government both state and national their fullest sympathy and support; and it is likewise their duty and privilege to jealously guard their rights and liberties, and whenever any department is administered detrimental to their best interest it is a duty they owe themselves to displace their officers with more faithful public servants. There is nothing so intricate in the machinery of our government but what the majority of the people can understand it. The administration of justice requires more learning than any other department and under our system is the most important, and is at the same time most exposed to controlling influences. A learned Judge can write a decision, on any disputed case, which will read well, and fill in with authorities to sustain either of the conflicting positions and claim that his opinion is sustained by precedent and authority. But when a continuous line of decisions are followed by an unbroken line of judgments which in their operation become barthenome and oppressive to a large portion of a community the people readily understand the infamy of these decisions and the condition of society at once demand that they shall be changed and that the error and abuse corrected by the election of other Judges. No decision should be followed as a precedent which will work an injustice in any given case and it is either a bad decision or an erroneous application that will deprive a suitor of his equitable rights. And whenever Court or Judge follow blind precedents to the injury of the substantial rights of litigants it is a duty which the people owe themselves to displace them with a more enlightened intelligence.

Home should be made pleasant and attractive as much so that no member of the family should have reason to entertain the thought that there is any place on Earth more desirable than home. Home is not real sweet home where strife and animosity exist. Home conversation should be kind and of the spirit of love. No vulgar phrases should be used, neither should the idle gossip abound. Harsh and angry words have a scathing influence on the soul as frost has on the tender and beautiful flower. Children cannot be expected to grow up and develop into manhood and womanhood with an amiable disposition and mild and sweet temper amidst turmoil and strife. Home should be made attractive and agreeable in every way possible; for "the home of the people is the strength of a nation." Would to God that more had homes that they might adorn and embellish them in accordance with wisdom and discretion. May the time soon come when crowns shall crumble and tyrants cease to rule, and when men shall learn war no more, when every man shall sit under his own vine and fig tree and when home shall universally be the place of intellectual and moral worth.
