STATE INSTITUTE.

The State Teachers' Association will convene at Astoria Monday evening, July 6th, and continue in session July 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th.

All teachers and friends of education are cordially invited to attend and aid in promoting and developing the educational work of our State.

An excellent programme is being prepared, and will be published at an early day. Prominent teachers and lecturers from our colleges and leading public schools will be present and take part in the exercises of the Association. Every effort will be made to make each session eminently interesting, instructive and successful.

Arrangements have been made by which all persons attending the Association and paying full fare over the East and West Side Divisions of the Oregon and California Railway to Portland, will be entitled to return tickets at eighty (80) per cent off from regular fare to destination.

Arrangements have been made with the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company for excursion rates of two dollars and fifty cents (2.50) per person from Portland to Astoria and return.

The Oregon Railway and Navigation Company's excursion steamers will leave Ash street dock, Portland, at 6 o'clock A. M. for Astoria, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, July 6th, 7th, and 8th, at which time round trip tickets may be purchased at the Ash street office.

By special arrangement, the return time on the Oregon and California Railway has been extended so as to include Thursday, July 16th, and by special arrangement the excursion rates on the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company's steamers will be good to return to Portland until September 30th.

This will enable persons from different parts of the State attending the Association to remain and visit the seacoast if they so desire.

Thursday, July 9th, will be devoted to excursions to Fort Stevens, Fort Canby, Ilwaco, Young's River Falls, and other points of interest. For this purpose arrangements have been made with Captain J. H. D. Gray, of the Ilwaco Steam Navigation Company, to furnish transportation on that company's steamers.

The leading hotels in Astoria will make liberal reductions, and the hospitable citizens of that city have arranged to entertain the visiting teachers during the days of the Association.

An extra session of the Legislature would cost a great deal of money. The people are worried by hard times and tired of being taxed. California is glutted with fruit, and the papers are calling a halt on the planting of new orchards or further production. The orchardists find a limited market, and the surplus of canned goods on hand from last year causes many of the canneries to exercise caution in the business. The outlook is not good in California for fruit raisers, and all through over production.

Salem Statesman: The session laws have just been completed and are now in the binder's hands. They contain over 600 pages and are the largest ever issued in Oregon. Also the rules and regulations for applications for pardons from the Penitentiary were issued this week in pamphlet form, by the Governor's Advisory Committee.

Great pressure from the East is being brought to bear upon Gov. Moody concerning the convening of an extra session of the Legislature. Let the Governor stiffen his back, appoint a senator and save the people many thousands of dollars. He is warned in time. Let him be wise and refuse to obey the party lash.

Honesty is always the best policy. Let the Governor appoint a U. S. Senator and then let the matter go before the people two years hence. This would be honest, economical and right. The people of Oregon demand to be heard upon this matter.

The sentiment of the people of Douglas county is against an extra session of the Legislature and they wish the Governor to know it.

DIED.

On the afternoon of last Wednesday at the home of his parents in this city after a brief illness, Ernest son of David C. and Electa McLellan, Ernest was born in Canyonville, Douglas county Oregon, on June 25th 1867 and was raised in this city. Death is sad and sorrowful at all times but in this instance the word sounds more than ordinarily mournful. It is too often the custom of newspapers to publish notices in praise of the dead in excess of merit, but of the youth just gone from among us forever none but words of goodness and love can truthfully be spoken. His childhood was of amiability and gentleness, his youth and approach to man's estate was characterized by fine sense, high honor and a true spirit of manhood. By the mature years he was observed and admired, to his companions he was endeared and by his parents and immediate friends he was deeply beloved. He was a member of the Brass Band of this city and though the youngest of their number was the first to pass away. Death has created a void in their ranks and hearts, and the latter can never be filled. His young life was simple, artless and pure. To his bereaved parents and sorrowing friends there can be no greater consolation than the consciousness that as he lived, so does he rest. Truly "he sleeps the sleep of the just."
