A PLAIN STATEMENT.

In the matter of the extra session of the Legislature there is but one question before the people and that is the Senatorship. In other words if the last Legislature had elected a United States Senator there would be no one who would wish an extra session. This is a fair, straight-forward statement and will not be contradicted. All arguments based upon any other grounds are frivolous, hypocritical, uncalculated for and unworthy of notice.

We now wish to inform our citizens that it is time that we show the Band that its course has been watched and approved. That we all, individually and collectively appreciate their efforts and are willing to do something ourselves in behalf of our city.

To come briefly to the point, a stand should be erected and presented to the Band, where they could discourse sweet music for the edification of the public. It should be a neat structure, say octagon-shaped, with railing, roof, small flag-staff and prettily painted.

The ungenerous and reprehensible insinuation made about Hon. L. F. Lane of Roseburg in last Friday's Oregonian July 3rd. is one of the most unnecessary utterances that we have seen in that paper for some time.

Mr. Lane is a private citizen and not a public officer, and is therefore not amenable to the Oregonian for his private acts. That paper however, has assumed the right it seems, to drag the short-comings of public officers (if they be democrats) as well as private citizens before the public gaze and cast scurrilous insinuations without cause or provocation.

The "Southern Confederacy" seems to be running this government very well after all, but according to the theory of H. W. Scott, President Cleveland has followed his immediate predecessors in all that he does, hence his success. At any rate he is doing it much better than was anticipated by some people, and we ought to all rejoice in common, because we have such a solid government, that it matters but little who wears the crown or wields the sceptre.

The Oregonian and News are having a lively argument over so-called "Bogus Journalism." The truth of the matter is that the pluck, vim and energy backing the news is beginning to tell and the Oregonian is suffering in consequence. All parties who desire to get rid of the thrall of the Oregonian in its monopoly of the telegraphic news can not do better than to subscribe for the Portland Daily News. The progress it has made in the year past shows that it is to be the great paper of the State.

In its continued and most unwarren attacks upon Mr. Flood the Oregonian takes occasion to refer to Mr. Sol. Abraham, his father-in-law. This is worthy the rank venom of a wretched viper in dog days. Mr. Abraham is a private citizen and minds his own business. Whether he is Republican or Democrat is immaterial. It is quite evident he does not wear Harvey Scott's collar, and that's what accounts for the milk in the Cocoa-nut.

Let the people decide whether the next United States Senator from Oregon shall be a Democrat or a Republican. No honest man can object to this proposition. Let the people rule. Do not circumvent the ballot box, either by the "shot gun," technicality, or trickery.

WHY should the Corvallis Gazette and some other Republican papers try to pull the wool over the eyes of the people in regard to an extra session of the Legislature, by discussing issues that are not germane. Be honest, and say the Senator is the question, "simply this, and nothing more."

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THE FOURTH AT ROSEBURG.

The Natal Day Celebrated in Grand and Becoming Style.

And sure enough as had been predicted and desired the sun rose that memorable morning without a cloud to dim its radiance or a blast from heaven to mellow its glowing heat, hence everybody got hot, and kept hot all day, and until the twinkling sentinels of the sky stepped out upon the edge of heaven's porch and argued with the young man and maiden that Sunday begins at midnight in the Christian era. The Y. D. Band opened the day's proceedings by giving forth dulcet strains at the court house about 9 o'clock, A. M. the crowd gathered, that had come from hill and dale. The liberty car was well replenished with little girls, officers of the day seated in a carriage, then the famous bicyclist lead the way, and by the assistance of the marshalls kept the way clear for the pageantry that followed in carriages, buggies, hacks, dogcarts, on horseback and afoot until we arrived at the grove when the President of the day Hon. D. S. K. Buick ordered the programme carried out, prayer by the chaplain, reading of the Declaration of Independence by Major Welch, and then the Orator of the day Hon. J. C. Fallerton was introduced, and he proceeded to give us one of the best orations we have ever had. Hard Times.

We hear it said nearly every day. Let us see if there is not a disease some where located in the body economic. Our own opinion is that about two or three years ago we were dancing all the while, and now we have to pay the fiddler, and that is about all there is of it. The great mistake was, the people went in debt on the principle of a dollar a bushel for wheat and twenty-five cents a pound for wool. If the war had continued in Europe, we would have gone beyond our income again, and the payment of our debts would thus have only been postponed, not paid. There are men making money all the while and the country is in a state of real prosperity, if we would only pause long enough to reflect. Pessimistic teaching is not the thing to which we should give audience.

It appears to us that the rates charged by Wells, Fargo & Co's Express on fruits and vegetables from this county to Portland are so high as to exclude shipment. A reduction to at least 75 cents per hundred pounds we think could be made in justice to all parties and would greatly benefit the company also. Wells, Fargo & Co. have now a monopoly of the business but their career in the past was not one of extortion, and they should make their policy more liberal at present and corresponding with hard times. Fruit is going to waste here which at same reduction could be shipped to Portland.
