STATE NORMAL SCHOOL CATALOGUE.—We have received the Third Annual Catalogue of the Oregon State Normal School at Monmouth. Its 36 closely printed pages are full of information concerning the Normal School and its relation to educational work in general. First we find a good view of the buildings. The Faculty remains the same as in the preceding years except that Miss Rachel Loughery, a former graduate from the institution, now becomes principal of the Model Primary School. There are seven professors and teachers. There were 202 students the past year and 17 candidates for graduation in the different departments. The Normal graduates receive diplomas from the State authorizing them to teach in any public school in the State without further examination. The course of study, though completed in three years, seems to be very full and practical. The expenses are less than at most schools. There are 72 Free Scholarships. Catalogues and full information will be furnished free on application to President D. T. Stanley, Monmouth. We are glad to note the great success of this school in our State as its work is badly needed as a means of improving our common schools.

A Good Showing.
What can and has been done on one half acre of ground in Douglas county with proper care and attention in 8 years. The amount or number of fruit trees is 24 cherries, best varieties, 20 plums, 4 pears, 6 apples, 2 prunes, 9 peaches, 1 almond, 2 figs, 8 walnuts, 1 chestnut, 1 mulberry, 2 Siberian crab, 3 varieties of grapes, currants, gooseberries, strawberries, blackberries and raspberries.
The amount of ornamental shrubbery and evergreens is 2 golden arbor vita, 2 Irish juniper, 2 Monterey cypress, 2 tamarac, 3 Scotch broom, 1 variegated maple, 3 silver maples, 1 mountain ash, 20 native evergreens, 2 Italian cypress, and over 1200 varieties of flowers and shrubs. 2 varieties of oleander 7 1/2 ft. in height, and a large cactus is 6 feet high. Caladium esculentum leaves 4 1/2 inches long and 2 1/2 inches wide. Hardy hydrangea with 22 clusters of white flowers some measuring 28 inches in circumference and 88 inches in length. The amount of fruit taken off and yet to be taken off is guessed at 50 gallons gooseberries, 25 gallons currants, 25 bushels cherries, 15 bushels plums, 25 bushels peaches and all the grapes and strawberries that we could make use of besides a few of the best varieties of vegetables.

—Heavy rains are reported in Eastern Oregon.
