Miss Agnes Beckwith is one of the most remarkable of lady swimmers. Many will remember her great swim from Sandy Hook to Rockaway Inlet in a heavy sea about two years ago, on which occasion she swam sixteen miles in 4h. 59 min. 10 sec. Her long swim of 100 hour in the Westminster Aquarium in 1880 was also a remarkable feat. When but fourteen years old, or in 1875, Miss Beckwith accomplished the unprecedented feat by a woman of swimming five miles in the Thames River in 1h. 9 min., and a year later she swam twenty miles in 6h. 25 min. One of the most remarkable swimming feats on record, however, was also accomplished by a female nator, Miss Edith Johnson, who swam for thirty-one consecutive hours in the Black Pool England, Bath. Other women have distinguished themselves in the water. Miss Theresa Johnson, Miss Laura Saigeman and Miss Emily Parker were all got through the water for given distances in faster time than any other women. "Lurline" the water queen, was wont to remain under water long enough to partake of light refreshments and at the Oxford Music Hall, in London, in 1881, she remained submerged for 2 min. 51 sec.

### STATE NEWS.

The Monks at Mt. Angel, Marion county, paid \$500 fine to the U. S. government for the attempt to make their own beer and strong liquors.

The O. R. & N. Co. are building a steamer 200 feet long, especially designed for wheat and freight, to carry 300 tons at any stage of water in the Snake river. It will be ready in the spring, and will run between Lewiston and Riparian.

By straightening the railroad between Delta and Roseburg the Central Pacific people claim they can shorten the route about twenty-one miles. One of the main changes is to run it over what is known as Willow Springs gap, which would bring the road much nearer Jacksonville than it now is.—Times.

As one result of the antislavery agitation in Portland, the following hotels and restaurants have discharged their heathen help and hired white assistants instead: Oregon, St. Charles, International, Overland, National, New York, Metropolis, Columbia and Quincy hotels, and the Pine-street coffee house, United States, Bench and Morning Star restaurants.—Statesman.

Noticing a statement of several large yields of potatoes, Samuel Boyles of Warne, Wasco county, writes to this paper of his experience of the old-fashioned blue New-Hampshire. He planted one which weighed about four ounces on the first day of May. In October he dug 140 pounds by actual weight, the yield of the one potato planted. He offers this as the largest yield ever known in the state.

The officers of the steamer Coos Bay say the coal from the Henryville mine is far superior for steam purposes to any other coal yet used on that vessel. The round trip from this place and San Francisco is now made with from 38 to 40 tons of Henryville coal, whereas from 55 to 60 tons of other coal was formerly consumed. The demand for Henryville coal at San Francisco is said to greatly exceed the supply. This should stimulate the opening of the mine to its full capacity as speedily as possible.

Capt. W. W. Sanders, late editor of the Benton "Leader," published at Corvallis, shot and killed a young man named James Campbell near the Court house in Albany on Wednesday evening of last week. Both parties were suitors for the hand of Miss Mattie Allison, a handsome milliner of Albany, and jealousy is supposed to be the cause. Campbell and Miss Allison were out taking a walk when the tragedy occurred and the wounds inflicted were shot from behind. Sanders was arrested and lodged in jail. Later reports are that Miss Allison is also in jail.

A gentleman who recently visited the Harney country informs us that the many reports circulated, regarding the soil of that section not being productive, are false. He says wheat and barley are grown to perfection, and many of the hardy vegetables are raised there, equal both in size and quantity to those produced anywhere, even in some parts of the valley, corn, tomatoes and melons are raised. As a stock country, he thinks it has no superior on the coast, there being abundance of the best quality of range and endless natural meadows.—Oreino Review.

The Chinese of Portland are determined to stand on the defensive, and evidently understand the maxim, in time of peace prepare for war. One gun store in that city has sold ninety weapons to Chinese during the past week. These consisted of double action Colt's revolvers, and a few Winchester rifles. Wednesday a couple of hearth-pieces purchased two splendid revolvers and 300 rounds of ammunition. When asked the reason for such warlike preparations, they replied that the arms and munition were to be used to guard themselves against any possible demonstration the whites might make.

On the 24th of October Mr. E. Allen who had personal charge of the "missionary car," left Louisville for New Orleans. He accompanied the car to the Crescent city and must have arrived there some days ago. All the articles have been taken from the car and placed in the exposition building. These various products will be added to the articles which were on exhibition last year and will constitute the Oregon display. The New Orleans exposition will open next Tuesday and will continue until March 19, 1886. The "missionary car," after all the articles were removed, was sent back to Omaha and turned over to the railroad company.—Telegram.

The reception closed with an enjoyable dance to splendid music.
