STATE NEWS
John B. McClure of Salem, has been appointed Indian agent for the Umatilla reservation.

A friend at our elbow desires to know if a man living at Grant's Pass, Josephine county, can represent Douglas county in the called session of the Legislature?
The C. & O. stages began running upon winter time last Monday, which gives them forty hours between Delta and Ashland if they choose to consume it all in the trip. The stages arrive now after daylight in the morning.
There was in store at stations on the O. R. & N. Co.'s railway lines in eastern Oregon and Washington, and in Idaho, and at landings on Snake river on first of November, 122,557 tons of wheat. This amount nearly equals the entire surplus last season.
There will be no more elections in the United States in October. The "October states" are a thing of the past. The last one to adhere to the October system was Ohio, and at the late election in that state it was determined by an affirmative vote of 537,000 that all elections shall hereafter be held in November.
In the Democratic council held at the Holden House, Portland 7th, a report and resolutions were adopted. The fifth section referred apparently to the corruption money of the Northern Pacific. It is stated: "We view with alarm the manifest agency of 'organized capital' in the indecent haste of this special session to forestall a just public expression of next June."
Last Sunday night three burglaries were committed in East Portland. The residence of C. A. Meussdorfer was entered by the front window and \$500 in jewelry and a little money stolen; a rifle and a shotgun disappeared from the house of J. R. Shaw, and the safe of Hudson & Brown was blown open and \$120 in money and a farmer's purse, containing an amount unknown, stolen therefrom.
The Statesman, Plaindealer, Oregon City Enterprise and several other republican papers before the New York election twitted the democrats about how overwhelmingly the republicans would sit down on democrats in that state, but since the election they have had nothing to say. Gentlemen we are now under the head of "Good of the Order," any one may speak without motion. What have you to say?—Dem.
A good deal has been said of late about the supposed feasibility of a route through Hudson's bay for transportation of the products of the middle portion of the continent to Europe. The project has been commended on the claim that it would give a comparatively short rail route, and thereby make transportation cheap. The projectors have expressed a belief that lines of railroad from the central portions of the continent, reaching as far south as Colorado and Kansas, would converge upon Hudson's bay.
Fred Schwatka is planning another Arctic expedition. He is reported as saying that he is convinced that no vessel will ever reach the pole, and that he will not attempt to get there by that means. He proposes to get as far north with a ship as practicable, and then travel over the ice on sleds. He will depend entirely on the natives to drive the dogs, as he believes they are better fitted for the work than white men. He says the natives travel more rapidly and of course have better knowledge of the land. He expects to be ready to start with the opening of spring and is fully confident that he is going to get there this time. It is also stated that Engineer Melville is planning another expedition.
