Should silver coinage be suspended This is the most important question which the present Congress of the United States is called upon to solve; and upon its action, in a measure, de pends the material welfare of the Pacific states and territories as well as the prosperity of the entire country. The silver dollar is esentially the money of the poor man. It is the money he receives for his days' work and pays to the butcher, miller and grocer for the sustenance of life. Om states and territories produce the bul lion; the millions of our people need the money to carry on the business relations of life, and there is no reason why the Government should not only coin this silver but put it in circulation instead of locking it up in the treasury vaults. The President, in his message, and the Hon. Secretary of the Treasury in his report to Congress make public the statement, that under the Silver Coinage Act the Government has paid out of the Treasury each and every month two million dollars gold coin for the silver bullion for the mint, to be added to the idle mass already accumulated, and uses this statement in connection with gold bugs of the East as an argument in favor of the repeal of the Silver Bill. On this statement that the silver dollar is massing in the Treasury hangs the main argument in favor of its demone tization. Let us, for a moment, analyze the bill and see if the Treasurer of the United States is compelled to use the gold coin belonging to the Government to the exclusion of silver for the purchase of bullion when an idle mass of silver dollars remain in the Treasury vaults unappropriated. If not then the major premise laid down by the President and his Hon. Secretary is wrong and their conclusion that silver gon city securing favorable legislation coinage should cease is erroneous.

ROSEBURG NOT OREGON CITY.

It is announced that immediately after the holidays Mr. Hermann will introduce bills for among others the following purposes: One appropriating \$50,000 for a public building at Oregon city to be used for Land office, Signal service and Post office; also one appropriating similar amount for like purpose in Roseburg. These bills are in response to a memomorial of the Oregon Legislature passed last winter and Mr. Hermann is doing quite right in heeding a request from so high a source. Nevertheless we regard it unfortunate as well as unjust that the claims of Roseburg for this legislation should be embarrassed by association with those of any other place. In other words we prefer that Roseburg should stand upon her own merits. The original memorial was drafted by Hon. L. F. Lane of this place and represented that the Federal offices located at Roseburg, namely, the Land office, the Signal service and Post office occupied private buildings at consider able rental expense and that the erection of a suitable five story building for government uses would be in the direction of economy and retrenchment etc. and prayed that Congress appropriate \$50,000 for the purchase of a site and erection of such building. This was forwarded by Mr. Isidore Caro to Senator Shupe who at once introduced it and urged its adoption. Upon motion of Senator Myers the name of Oregon city was inserted and as thus amended the memorial passed both bodies February 19, 1885. This we insist was unjust to Roseburg. It should be remembered that there is no Signal station at Oregon city and it is not likely that there ever will be one established. Portland and Roseburg are quite sufficient for Western Oregon. It is even probable that the land office will be removed from Oregon city within the next four years and the business transfered to the Dalles and this office. We do not object to Ore-




