PROHIBITION POINTS.

THE EFFECT OF PROHIBITION IN NEWARK.

Business Better—Real Estate Advancing. A New Bank Added, Churches Built. A Ringing Letter "Signed by Every Merchant and Business Man in Newark," Etc.

This letter has been received at Prohibition headquarters, and will be shown by one wishing to examine it.

Newark, Ga., October 30, 1885—Gentlemen: In reply to your letter of the 29th instant, beg leave to submit the following:

1. Since prohibition went into operation in Coweta county, there has been a steady and healthy increase of business. There has been a marked revival in commercial transactions, and our county was never in a more flourishing condition.

2. There has been more building and more improvements in real estate since the adoption of prohibition measures three years ago than in the ten years preceding. The value of real estate has been increased 25 per cent. We have built three large manufacturing establishments. We have invested \$20,000 in one new church and in completing and repairing two other church buildings. A large number of brick stores have been erected, a second national bank has been chartered and located here—and our course is onward and upward.

3. As a necessary result there has been an increased demand for labor. There are persons here today doing well in our workshops who left your city to avoid the temptation of the dramshops.

4. It has been remarked by manufacturers that the quality of labor has been improved.

5. The attendance on divine service has been increased largely and the membership strengthened and revived. Without boasting we can say that the morals of our people have wonderfully improved. Drunkenness is a thing of the past. We occasionally see a man under the influence of whiskey but not frequently it turns out he has been on a visit to Atlanta. Our jails are empty our criminal docket shows 75 per cent decrease in crime. Before prohibition went into operation it frequently took a week to try the criminals—it now takes one day.

6. "HIGH LICENSE" we found to be "a delusion and a snare." Between high and low license there is the same difference as there is between the barter of public virtue for one hundred dollars and two hundred dollars.

7. Our colored population are enthusiastic in their support of prohibition measures.
