SENATOR JOHN F. MILLER.
The death of Senator John F. Miller of California, which has been expected daily for several weeks, occurred March 8th, at Washington. Senator Miller was born in Indiana in 1831, and in early life was a lawyer. He lived in California for several years during the fifties, but returned to Indiana before the war. He resigned a state senatorship in that state to become a colonel of volunteers and did valiant service during the war as a colonel and brigadier general. He was brevetted a major general for conspicuous bravery at the battle of Nashville, where he commanded the left division. He returned to California after the war as collector of the port of San Francisco and since that time has been in public life almost constantly. Within the past fifteen years he grew immensely rich in the Alaska fur trade. The senatorial term for which he was elected will expire on the 4th day of next March. The California legislature will not meet till next January, so his place will be filled by appointment. The Governor of California is a democrat and, of course, may be expected to appoint some man of his own party—Oregonian.
