WHEREAS, A large number of Temperance men in both the Democratic and Republican parties still cling to the forlorn hope that their respective parties will yet adopt Prohibition as one of the Cardinal principles of their party and openly declare in favor of the absolute destruction of the Liquor traffic.

Therefore be it further resolved that this convention holding the success of Prohibition above all other questions now before the American people party feally included, hereby declare that if the Democratic and Republican parties or either of them shall declare in their county and state platforms, for prohibition of the Liquor traffic by state and national law nominating upon such platform who are consistent Temperance men favoring Prohibition.

Then it is hereby made the duty of the Chairman of the County Central Committee to assemble the same and by public notice through the press, withdraw the nominees of this convention in favor of and in behalf of the party openly and frankly espousing the cause of Prohibition.

And be it further resolved that in case neither party adopt Prohibition as a cardinal principle of its party—then it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the County Central Committee to reassemble this Convention to perfect a complete county ticket for all county offices. B. F. RAMF, Secretary.
