TEN QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

The Plaindealer of last week headed an article "Some things we would like to know," and then asks ten consecutive questions as follows; and we also append the answers.

"Why do the liquor men rejoice at the election of Judge Strahan?"

We do not know, for a great many temperance men rejoice also.

"Why do Republican saloon keepers boycott the Plaindealer but subscribe for The Review, notwithstanding its politics?"

The only reason we can assign Bro. Plaindealer is, the saloon keepers want a good newspaper, notwithstanding everyone of them knows our views on the traffic in which they are engaged, and in this particularly we practice what we preach, and moreover, they have no objections to a good, sound, temperance paper even if it is Democratic.

"If the Republican party can trust Joe Simon, who in his official capacity is a Republican, but who as an individual votes as a Democrat?"

About this man we know but little, but if we belonged to "the party of progress, and moral ideas," we certainly would ask the gentleman to resign his lofty position that he holds in his party.

"Why do the liquor men all over the State want the pending constitution amendment submitted at a special election, if submitted within thirty days after the Legislature adjourns?"

We never heard of this proposition before and *why* we do not know.

"If drinking publicly on the street of Roseburg during a Prohibition serenade is just the thing?"

We do not believe drinking "publicly" or privately is just the thing.

"If the editor of The Review voted the straight Democratic ticket and if not, why not?"

We did have a couple of friends for whom we voted on the Republican ticket, hence we did not vote the straight Democratic ticket. Did the editor of the Plaindealer vote for Mr. Tobias for County Supt.? Echo answers no. Bro. do you take it straight or mixed. This is one thing we would like to know.

"If a man votes for the most important candidates on the Democratic ticket does that make him a good Republican?"

We answer it certainly is a symptom of being a good citizen, and having at heart the best interests of his country. It may not make him a good Republican after the sort of some, but it does elevate him in the estimation of all clear-headed, well thinking people.

"If the whiskey vote of the Republican party which has made the supreme bench Democratic, has been working in the interests of the party and are they satisfied?"

We did not know before that the "whiskey element" in the Republican party was so strong as to overcome such a large Republican majority as seems to be claimed for Oregon. And further, we had supposed that all the Republicans were all temperance men if we are to judge by the boastings of some on certain occasions. No, there are not enough whiskey Republicans to elect a Democratic Supreme Judge in Oregon, yet we believe all are satisfied that Strahan will make one of the best Judges Oregon ever had. Now mark what we say.

"If the same vote did not help to elect Penney—but still they are honorable Republicans."

We have no means of knowing except this, we do know no man is disgraced to vote for an honorable man. Sylvester Penney is an honorable man, therefore all Republicans are honorable men that voted for Penney.

"If the ring that tried to bust the Oregonian succeeded, or did it get busted in return?"

We do not know about the ring, the Oregonian does not show that the tail of a cyclone had struck it, but we must confess that the Republican party in Oregon looks more like it is "busted" than anything we have seen lately except it is the Plaindealer. Justice.  
There is one phase of the labor question that is too often overlooked by the laboring men, and that is that the price of a day's labor can no more be regulated by force than can the price of a bushel of wheat. The law may do much toward protecting laboring men from unjust oppression, and boards of arbitration may sometimes be useful in settling disputes between laborers and employers, but laws and boards of arbitration can no more compel a manufacturer to pay more for labor than his finished product will justify than they can compel the laborer to work for wages which he deems insufficient. We are free men in America, the employer no less than the employee.—Albany Bulletin.

Under the Dow law, which is a virtually re-enactment of the Scott law, the county of Hamilton, in which Cincinnati is situated, will receive as tax and penalties from liquor dealers the sum of \$1,070,600. It will take something more than Democratic Prohibition logic to make sensible people believe that free whiskey is better than a law that brings about such a result.—News.

The above is from the leading stalwart Republican paper in Oregon, and shows plainly that they have imbibed the Blaine and Logan or the whisky doctrine traffic. High license is the word, and take the tax to build school houses, blood money says Messrs Blaine and Logan. We believe you should not tax the traffic any more than anything else, is taxed.

It will perhaps be about a stand off throughout the territory. Mrs. Dunniway and her coadjutors fought the local option law with might and main. The Oregonian's editorial last Wednesday on the woman suffrage question is just about the correct idea. Women are not unanimous for the suppression of the traffic.

Of the 108 Senators, members and Territorial delegates who compose Congress, seventy-two are Methodists, sixty-three Baptists, forty-one Episcopalians, thirty-seven Presbyterians, thirty-six Catholics, fifteen Unitarians, eight Lutherans, ten Christians (Campbellites), and two Quakers, making a total of 283 who are actively connected with some church organization. This leaves 125 who either never belonged to any church or have drifted out of such association.

A claim is put up in Washington territory that the women must vote so as to uphold the liquor traffic, in order to justify the bestowal of suffrage upon themselves. But the argument should be just the other way. If women don't cast their votes so as to hurt the liquor traffic their failure to do so will be proof that they ought never to have the right of suffrage at all.—Oregonian.

We fully agree with the above sentiment, that women should vote (where they can) and use their influence for the suppression of the liquor traffic.

Out of the twenty-seven counties in the state, Gov. Penney carries all but Tillamook, Washington, Marion, Coos, Curry and Yamhill. Had the Republicans of those counties suspected what was coming, they would have stood in and made it "unanimous." As it is, we forgive them and hope they will repent in good time.—Weekly World.

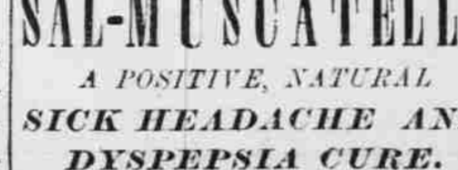
