A DEMOCRATIC PLANK.

Mr. Flood of the Star wants to know how we like the plank in the Illinois Democratic platform in reference to temperance. We simply answer, we do not like it at all, because it is unsound, and quibbling. Here is the plank.

Resolved, That while we have no purpose to interfere with just laws for the regulation of traffic in intoxicating liquors, and for the prevention or correction of the evil to society growing out of abuses in their sale, we declare that it is not the legitimate province of the government to control the habits, tastes, appetites and liberties of the people, so long as they are orderly and peaceable, and do not encroach upon the rights of others or of society. We therefore declare that the prohibition, by the constitution or by the general laws, of the manufacture or sale of wine, malt or spirituous liquors would be in violation of individual and personal rights, and contrary to fundamental principles of free government.

Habits, tastes, and appetites are not always hereditary, therefore these "habits, tastes, and appetites," should not be classed with "liberties." And moreover notice this qualifying clause, "and do not encroach upon the rights of others or of society." Now this is exactly what this thing does. This is the reason why we are opposed to the traffic in liquors, because it does "encroach" in a thousand ways upon society and the rights of others. And to say that it is "contrary to fundamental principles of free government," to legislate against anything that harasses a people, is simply absurd and reflects a want of information, as to what constitutes fundamental and free government. But Mr. Flood ought to know, that the Democracy of Oregon and many other states, as well as the national Democratic platform, contains no such plank. There is not a Democratic plank in the union, where the Democracy is in the ascendancy, that has embodied such a plank as above quoted, but on the contrary, many states have spoken just the opposite of Illinois. The Democracy of Illinois, is not our oracle by any means, neither can we endorse all that a capricious humanity might suggest.

In answer to Mr. Blaine's speech the New York Evening Post cites the fact that a meeting of textile workers in Philadelphia, held on the 29th of May last, declared "that the present deplorable condition of labor in the United States, which in many instances borders on serfdom and chattel slavery, is the most positive evidence that the system of protection now in vogue is not productive of any benefit to labor, but is the builder up of vast fortunes on the one hand and increased poverty and squallor among the working people on the other."

ANOTHER SURVEY.

Report of Surveyor of Examining Route from Canyonville to Crater Lake.

The undersigned would respectfully present to the citizens of Douglas county state of Oregon the following report of my survey of the route from Canyonville to Crater lake in this state, and would represent that for want of time. I have not been able to make as full a report as the subsequent one, which will soon be produced. In said subsequent report a full map of this survey will be filed in the Clerk's office for public inspection, showing the profile of said survey.

On the 17th day of August 1886 I accompanied by J. S. Pickett, J. B. Fullerton, W. B. Pool, Edd. Bealman, T. Tiller, J. A. Tiller and D. Dumont, I started from Canyonville and explored the route for a wagon road to Crater lake. On my way up the South Umpqua river, and after selecting the most feasible route and passes, then on my return made a regular survey. The said survey includes the entire route to be built from the Jacksonville and Ft. Klamath wagon road to the terminus of the wagon road up the South Umpqua river. The total of wagon road to be built is thirty-three miles fifty-eight chains and sixty-nine links, which will unite the two systems of eastern and western Oregon. Of the above distance one mile eleven chains and seventy-three links are heavy rock grading, ten miles twenty-five chains and ninety-four links are light grading, leaving a remainder of twenty-two miles twenty-one chains and two links requiring no grading. I estimate the cost of construction of the above described road as follows:

Heavy grading as above \$2,800
Light grading as above 8,400
Clearing road of logs, trees, etc. 1,300
Total \$12,500

I am so confident that the above estimate is reasonable that I would be glad to take the contract of building the road for that sum. I may remark that when this thirty-three miles fifty-eight chains and ninety-four links is made a road, not an other road of road is necessary to let us through to Crater lake. The south end of Crater lake is in a due east course from Canyonville. The distances from Canyonville are as follows: County road from Canyonville to mouth of Elk creek twenty-two miles, surveyed road thirty-three miles fifty-eight chains and ninety-four links to Rogue river. From Rogue river to Crater lake eighteen miles, makes a total distance from Canyonville to Crater lake of seventy-three miles fifty-eight chains and sixty-nine links. The altitude of the prominent points above the sea level are as follows: Canyonville, 793 ft. crossing at the forks of the South Umpqua river 1000 ft. main divide between Umpqua and Rogue rivers at the Hulbert R. R. gap 4545 ft., crossing of Rogue river 3380 ft., at the rim of Crater lake 7000 ft. Some idea of the commerce of eastern Oregon may be gathered by the fact, that in traveling on the Jacksonville and Klamath lake road the distance of 16 miles we met 20 loaded wagons on their way to Ft. Klamath and Crater lake besides several packed animals and horsemen. From the above premises I am prepared to state that either Riddle or Myrtle Creek depot is nearer Ft. Klamath or Crater lake than at any other point on the line of the R. R. In conclusion I will state that at no point on the proposed road that it will be necessary to have a steeper grade than the grade through the big canyon in the southern part of Douglas county Oregon all of which is respectfully submitted,
